The Presbyterian church at Libertyville last week was damaged by flames that burned the upper portion of the building to such an extent that it is believed beyond repair. Plans are under way for erection of a new building.

Dayton Kramer, a member of the Waukegan high school track team and R. O. T. C., was injured last week when a bullet fired on the practice range at the high school struck a bolt and was deflected up, striking the boy in the abdomen, piercing his intestines in several places.

CONSERVATION DINNER IS FEDERATION PLAN

Banquet This Year to Take the Place of Annual Exhibit; Some Features

A conservation dinner will be held March 9 at 6:30 in the club rooms of the Chicago Woman's club by the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs. There will be no annual exhibit by the federation and other organizations which usually hold a week's exhibit at a local store, the dinner this year taking the place of the annual event. The Preservation of the Wild Flower society, and clubs such as the Prairie, Out-of-Door league, and Sun-flowers are working hard with the state to make this a helpful and interesting meeting.

Mrs. J. D. McKinney of Alton, state conservation chairman will preside, assisted by the past state chairman, Mrs. Chas. J. Caldwell and Mrs. Theron Colton, well known naturalist, who has charge of the program. Mrs. McKinney is offering a prize to eighth grade pupils of the state for the best essay of not more than 500 words on "Birds." Essays are to be submitted to the district conserva-

tion chairman, who in turn will submit the best two for the state prize. The time limit for essays to be received is April 15. Names of prize winners will be announced at the convention at Danville in May. Mrs. Walter W. Seymour, state president will be the guest of honor at conservation dinner and will say "Within the department of Conservation we shall place the Garden clubs—for the interest of such groups to preserve beauty and art in the great out of doors will make such clubs the leaders in conservation."

ROAD REFUNDS AWAIT RESULT OF GAS TAX

County Superintendent Hears Nothing to Be Done Till Tax Fate Known

Refunds, of which Lake county has about \$825,000 due from the state, will be pushed into the background until the proposed gas tax of two cents on the gallon is settled, it was stated last week by R. M. Lobbell, county superintendent of highways.

Of the 102 counties in the state nearly all advanced a different idea of allocating the funds during the short course at the University of Illinois this week.

Some were in favor of the county keeping all, others wanted it to go to the state, and still others suggested several different possible "splits" between county and state. These highway superintendents see the gas tax as something that is inevitable.

Regarding route 173, that will connect Zion and Rockford, Mr. Lobbell states that the state highway department will hold public hearings on the proposition early in March. There may be one hearing or a hearing in Lake, Boone, McHenry and Winnebago counties.
