EXPERIMENTAL FARM FOR GREEK REFUGEES

Massachusetts Farmer Plans to Help Raise More Food In Place of Charity

The Near East Relief has received a gift of \$7000 a year to assist in a five-year demonstration of practical agriculture in Greece.

The gift will supplement the work already begun by the American organization at its demonstration farm on the island of Syra, which is in charge of Frederick Midgeley of Worcester, Mass., a retired New England farmer who made a fortune in celery on his Massachusetts farm.

Mr. Midgeley arrived in Greece three months ago, bringing with him a truck load of seed, a head full of common sense, and a life full of experience, and his expenses are being met by funds which otherwise would have been used to send food to Greek refugees. He expects to grow the first year about five times as much food as could have been purchased with the same amount of money.

"Money spent for food is soon gone and there is little to show from the expense," says Mr. Midgeley. "The same amount of money employed in a demonstration farm will assist persons in distress to find work, and soon they can be producing food for themselves. In some cases relief must concern itself with immediate necessities, and there is no course possible save to send food and clothing. Building for the future, however, the founding of self-sustaining communities is the important matter. This is what the demonstration farm hopes to accomplish."

SWIMS CHANNEL IN INDOOR POOL RACE

So far as is known, Winston Waddell, a 21-year-old Brooklyn plumber, is the first man to swim the English Channel in an indoor pool. Enjoying all the thrills except the grease and fog, he covered the twenty-one miles in 11 hours 47 minutes swimming time, during eight swimming periods in the Central Y. M. C. A. pool, Brooklyn, N. Y., and dropped nine pounds en route.

Waddell's record later was broken by Howard Hanson, Swedish natator of Bay Ridge, who covered the distance in 10 hours and 5 minutes, and thus won the Walter Spence medal for the best performance by a member of the Central Swimming club.
