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CITY PRIMARY IS HELD ON TUESDAY

RECORD VOTE REPORTED

Gourley, Lewis Lead in Totals; Becker, Clavey and Wood Eliminated; Election Is April 19

With the largest vote ever cast in a city primary election in Highland Park on Tuesday candidates were nominated for mayor and commissioners to be voted on at the regular city election on Tuesday, April 19. The total vote was about 2890.

The successful nominees are: For Mayor, **Frank L. Cheney** and Benjamin F. Lewis; for commissioners, Robert E. Bosworth, William J. Brown, Lyle Gourley, Mrs. Nanine G. Hopkins, Will Krumbach, Joan Oliver, William M. Reay, Julius Zimmer.

For the nomination for mayor Benjamin F. Lewis received 539 more votes than Frank L. Cheney. As they were the only candidates, both will be up for election April 19, and the one receiving the more votes then will be mayor for the next four years.

There were eleven candidates for nomination for commissioners, of whom the eight above mentioned were those receiving the most votes. Lyle Gourley, at present a commissioner, led the entire election in number of votes received, running about eight votes ahead of Lewis, according to the unofficial reports. William M. Reay and Joan Oliver also received a large vote each.

The total vote for each candidate in the seven voting precincts is as follows: Cheney, 1172; Lewis, 1717; Becker, 150; Bosworth, 805; Brown, 1022; Clavey, 461; Gourley, 1725; Hopkins, 960; Krumbach, 1011; Oliver, 1539; Reay, 1304; Wood, 793; Zimmer, 1256.

Chamber of Commerce at Session Arranges to Be Host to Women Evening of March 17th

Planning for a special entertainment for the ladies was one of the chief features of the regular monthly sessions of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce, held Tuesday evening of this week. Telegrams to state representatives protesting the proposed gasoline tax and urging state aid in the improvement of North Sheridan road in Highland Park were authorized; three new members were admitted and other business received attention.

Entertainment for Ladies
The plan for an entertainment for the ladies was enthusiastically received by the members, of whom there was present a good representation. It was planned to have the ladies as guests of the members at the Woman's club building on the evening of Thursday, March 17. The program has not been fully worked out, but it will include several acts of vaudeville, dancing and a buffet lunch, it is expected. Probably other interesting features will be added later as the committee gets down to work on the project. In any event the ladies are assured a good time on the evening in question. The affair is in charge of the entertainment committee.

ALFRED FRICK STILL ALIVE AT 11 O'CLOCK

The following telegram was received from the Public Service Company at 11 o'clock a. m., as we go to press, regarding the condition of Alfred Frick, the Public Service Co. employee who has been fighting for his life at St. Francis Hospital, Evanston:

"Alfred Frick still conscious and fighting for life after more than ninety hours of artificial respiration administered by fifty-six man crew working in shifts. Was able to take broth and egg-nogg through tube Wednesday night. Doctors on case say it is impossible to predict outcome although condition in general is somewhat better than Wednesday morning."

SEEKS TO OUST FILLING STATION

The City of Highland Park, in a bill for injunction, today is seeking to oust a filling station and hot dog stand that is entrenched on Green Bay road at the entrance to the city. In the bill it is alleged that the city after granting a temporary permit for the structure, later rescinded this order. The building is in conflict with the zoning laws, it is charged.

H. S. AUDITORIUM MURAL PAINTINGS

TO BE INSTALLED SOON

Expected to Be In Place By End of This Week; Description Indicates Beautiful Decoration

The decoration of the auditorium of the Deerfield-Shields high school, for which Fulsang and Roth, decorators of Highland Park, have the contract, is now nearing completion. The two large mural paintings will be in place by the end of this week.

These murals were composed and painted by A. E. S. S. S., the well known artist of Chicago, who has given a great deal of his time to the study of the different Greek characters and symbols, in an endeavor to illustrate the inscriptions from Shakespeare and Confucius selected by Mr. Sandwick, the principal of the high school, who has also given Mr. Fulsang a great deal of assistance through his knowledge of the Greek school and his friendly interest in the work.

Description
The painting under the inscription by Confucius shows a Greek academy on a high open marble terrace, overlooking the beautiful Aegean sea. The master is seated in a bronze chair on a raised marble platform instructing his pupils. Some are listening attentively, some are referring to the text on their parchment scrolls. At the extreme left is a polychrome statue of Pallas Athene, Goddess of Science and Domestic arts. In her left hand rests a small figure of "Victory," symbolizing the power of knowledge.

The azure sea below is dotted with various sunlit ships and islands. The largest near the center of the picture, with the painted bronze ram at the bow, is a warship of the Bireme type, whose red sail marks it as the ship of an admiral or monarch. The last youth at the right is beckoning to a fellow pupil to come and hear the lecture. (Continued on page 5)

Mrs. Mary Susie Genest, wife of Joseph Genest, died Thursday, March 3, at about 11 o'clock in the forenoon, following a very brief illness. Death was due to apoplexy and followed two strokes, one on Tuesday morning and the other a few moments before the end.

Mrs. Genest, whose maiden name was Mary Marx, was born September 20, 1878, in Aurora, Illinois, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. Marx. The mother is living, the father has been dead some time.

She was married to Joseph Genest, at Aurora, on August 7, 1901, and since that time had been a constant resident of Highland Park. Mr. Genest was a native of this city and has lived here all his life. At present he is in poor health and unable to be out.

There are four children, Edward, Arthur, Earl, and Mary Genest, all at home. Other near relatives are four sisters and three brothers, Mrs. Ova Ray, Mrs. Ray Cooper, Mrs. Agnes Krantz, Mrs. Annie Gleason and Charles, Michael and John Marx, all of Aurora.

Mrs. Genest was a faithful member of the Immaculate Conception church of the Mystic Workers and of the Altar and Rosary society. In her long residence here she had made a host of warm friends, whose sincere sympathy is extended the relatives in their bereavement.

The funeral service was held at the Immaculate Conception church on Saturday at 9 a. m., the Rev. Dr. O'Neill officiating, and burial was in the North Shore cemetery.

VIEWPOINT OF COALITION

Geo. A. Mason, Chairman of Publicity Committee of That Party Writes Regarding Election

The following statement has been received from Mr. George A. Mason, chairman of the publicity committee of the Coalition ticket in the city campaign and is here printed at the request of the committee and paid for by friends of the Coalition ticket:

The preliminary skirmish of the battle fought at the polls on April 19 for the election of a mayor and four commissioners has ended. Mr. Cheney and Mr. Lewis have been nominated for mayor and at the election one of them will be chosen to act for a period of four years. Messrs. Gourley, Oliver, Reay, Zimmer, Brown, Krumbach, Bosworth, and Mrs. Hopkins have been nominated for commissioners and four of them will be elected. They will hold office for four years. A good many people seem to think that the purpose of the primary was to elect officers. On the contrary its only purpose was to select candidates for office.

Those supporting the Coalition or Cheney ticket, so-called, from now on will devote themselves to presenting the real issues of the campaign and the merits of their candidates. We shall not spend much time combating the notion of a city manager for Highland Park. We shall, however discuss the alternatives which might be adopted if the so-called fee system were abolished. There is really no issue on the enforcement of the zoning ordinance because all true citizens of Highland Park favor its strict enforcement. Nor shall we discuss persons except so far as it will be necessary to throw light on their personalities and qualifications for office. (Continued on page 8)
