FUNERAL OF ALFRED FRICK HELD SUNDAY

Last Rites for Unfortunate Public Service Co. Employee at Crystal Lake

Funeral services for Alfred Frick, 22, until recently employed in the merchandise sales department of the Public Service company of Northern Illinois at Park Ridge, were held from the home of his parents in Crystal Lake, Sunday afternoon, March 13, at two o'clock. Rev. R. W. Putman of Crystal Lake M. E. church, officiated. Burial was in Union cemetery, Crystal Lake. The services were attended by scores of Public Service company employees from Evanston and Park Ridge as well as a number of company officials from Chicago. Six young men, all of whom aided Frick in his gallant fight for life, were pallbearers.

Frick's case sprang into national prominence when it became known that he was being kept alive by artificial respiration administered by fellow employees of the Public Service company, (who are trained regularly in resuscitation and first aid methods) following paralysis of his diaphragm Sunday morning, March 6. On Saturday he had become seriously ill and was taken to the St. Francis hospital in Evanston, where his illness was diagnosed as Landry's paralysis.

At 10 o'clock Sunday morning he ceased breathing, but was kept alive

by artificial respiration. More than 50 employees of the Public Service Company, organized in shifts and working in pairs, were constantly beside the stricken man, compressing and releasing his lungs in regular cadence similar to that of natural respiration.

Thursday night, however, it became evident that Frick would be unable to survive the paralytic stroke although until that time physicians had believed it possible that his remarkable endurance would carry him through.

His death occurred at 12 minutes after 10, Thursday night, March 10.

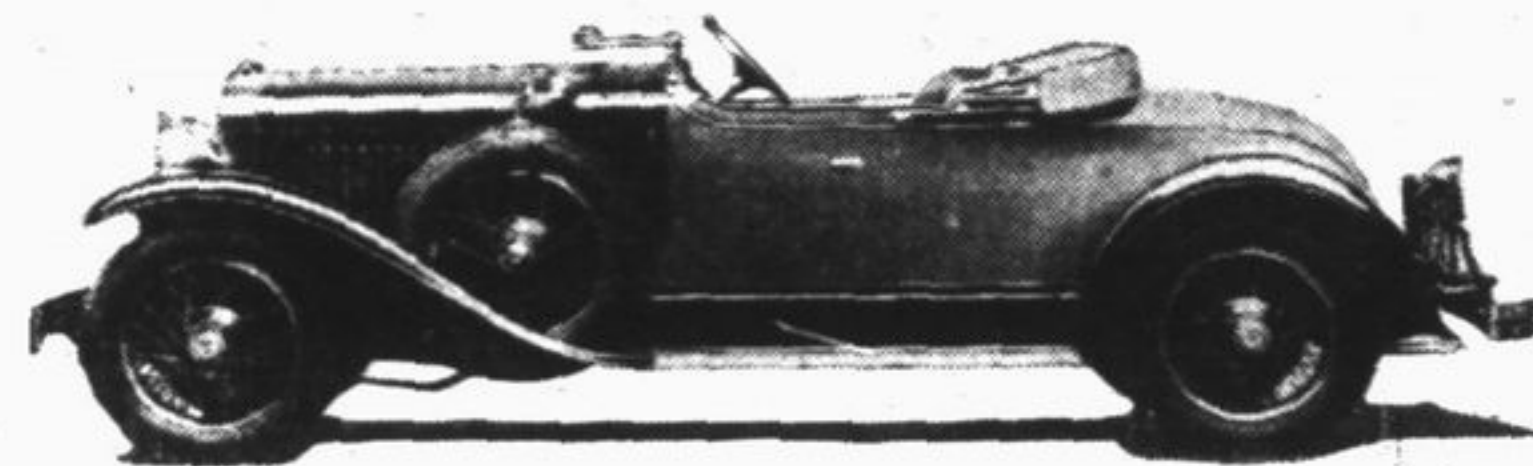
