FUNERAL OF ALFRED

ast Rites for Unfortunate Public Service Co. Employe at Crystal Lake

Funeral services for Alfred Frick, 22, until recently employed in the merchandise sales department of the Public Service company of Northern Illinois at Park Ridge, were held from the home of his parents in Crystal Lake, Sunday afternoon, March 13, at two o'clock. Rev. R. W. Putman of Crystal Lake M. E. church, officiated. Burial was in Union cemetery, Crystal Lake. The services were attended by scores of Public Service company employes from Evanston and Park Ridge as well as a number of company officials from Chicago. Six young men, all of whom aided Frick in his gallant fight for life, were pallbearers.

Frick's case sprang into national prominence when it became known that he was being kept alive by artificial respiration administered by fellow employes of the Public Service company, (who are trained regularly in resuscitation and first aid methods) following paralysis of his diophram Sunday morning, March 6. 
