

THREE NOMINEES FOR JUDGES SEEN

CONVENTION ON APRIL 16

It Will Be Held in Rockford and Judicial Election Is June 6; Lake Co. Is In This District

Three nominees to make the race for election as judges of the Circuit court in the Seventeenth judicial district which embraces Lake county on June 6 will be selected at a Republican party judicial convention which will be held in Rockford Saturday, April 16.

The convention date was fixed at Rockford Monday by chairman of the Republic central committee of Lake, Winnebago, McHenry, and Boone counties, the four counties in the district.

William J. Stratton, Ingleside, chairman of the Lake county, G. O. P. committee; C. M. Eldredge, Richmond, McHenry county chairman; John A. Fair of Belvidere, Boone county Republican chairman, and Franklin S. Garver, chairman of the Winnebago county G. O. P. organization, attended the meeting held in Rockford Saturday.

It was announced by the county G. O. P. leaders that precinct committeemen in all four counties of the judicial district will be called together on the Wednesday before the convention in their respective county seats to select delegates to the judicial convention here.

Edwards Up Again
The three sitting circuit judges in the Seventeenth judicial district, Judges A. E. Fisher, of Rockford; E. D. Shurtleff, of Marengo; and Claire C. Edwards, of Waukegan, are all expected to seek re-election. Although Judge Fisher was elected to the circuit bench only last fall to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Judge E. D. Reynolds, he must seek re-election again in June.

Whether other candidates will enter the field against any of the three judges to seek the Republican nomination is not known. Political leaders who can see no signs of a contest now for any one of the three judges, however, refused today to predict that there would be no other candidates.

The number of delegates which each of the four counties will have in the April 16th convention were fixed at the meeting as follows: Winnebago, 43; Lake, 39; McHenry, 20, and Boone, 9.

Representation of each county at the judicial convention is based on the vote for governor at the last gubernatorial election, each county being entitled to a delegation for every 400 votes or fraction thereof cast for governor at the last election.

State law makes it obligatory that the county chairman of each judicial district set the date for the judicial convention at least 75 days before the election and that the convention be held not later than 31 days before the election. The dates fixed at the meeting Monday are in strict compliance with this law.

LAKE CO. TEACHERS BEST PAID IN STATE

Statistics From Springfield So Indicate; Comparison Is Made

The wealth of Lake county is such that it is not necessary to appeal to the state for special aid to make it possible to pay school teachers a minimum of \$800 a year, according to a table just prepared at Springfield by the state department of public instruction.

There is a requisite that each full-time, elementary school teacher shall receive a minimum of \$800 a year but there are many school districts in the state in which the minimum

levies possible for education purposes at two percent, the amount allowed by law, make it impossible to pay the teachers the full \$800 per year.

The tables divide the state into counties, listing the number of school districts and showing those where the tax that can be levied permits of the payment of certain salaries. For example it lists those which are able to pay from \$700 to \$800 a year, those which are barely able to pay from \$600 to \$700, etc. There are some where the amount is less than \$200 a year. In districts where the amount is less than \$800 it is possible to get special aid.

The table shows that there is not a single district in Lake county where the yearly salary of full-time teachers is not more than \$800 a year. The same is true of Boone and McHenry counties which are in this district.

MRS. MYERS GIVEN LARGE SETTLEMENT

Wife of Builder of Skokie Valley Line Gets \$250,000 in Divorce Writ

What is believed to be the largest settlement ever given a wife in a divorce case in Milwaukee was received by Mrs. Caroline Myers last week, says a report from that city, when Circuit Judge Fairchild approved a stipulation under which she will obtain property valued at approximately \$250,000.

Fairchild granted Mrs. Myers a divorce by default from her millionaire husband, Lewis E. Myers, a Chicago contractor and engineer. Myers, who was in charge of the construction of the Skokie Valley route of the North Shore Line, is now in Havana, Cuba, where he is building a railroad.

The decree was awarded on the grounds of desertion. Her husband left her more than three years ago.
