The new rates are made effective on that date by authorization of the Interstate Commerce Commission acting on the petition recently filed by Green Bay road and Laurel avenue. the company. However, it is announced, round trip tickets between Chicago and Evanston stations and Kenosha, Racine and Milwaukee will be

sold at the present rates until April 1. Intrastate commutation rates in both Illinois and Wisconsin are in no way affected by the increase, it is pointed out by the North Shore line management. The new interstate rates will make the fare one way between the Chicago Loop and downtown Milwaukee \$3.06, the same as on the steam railroads, which is 49c more than the present rate of \$2.57.
