LET WATER MAIN JOB TO W. J. NEWMAN CO.

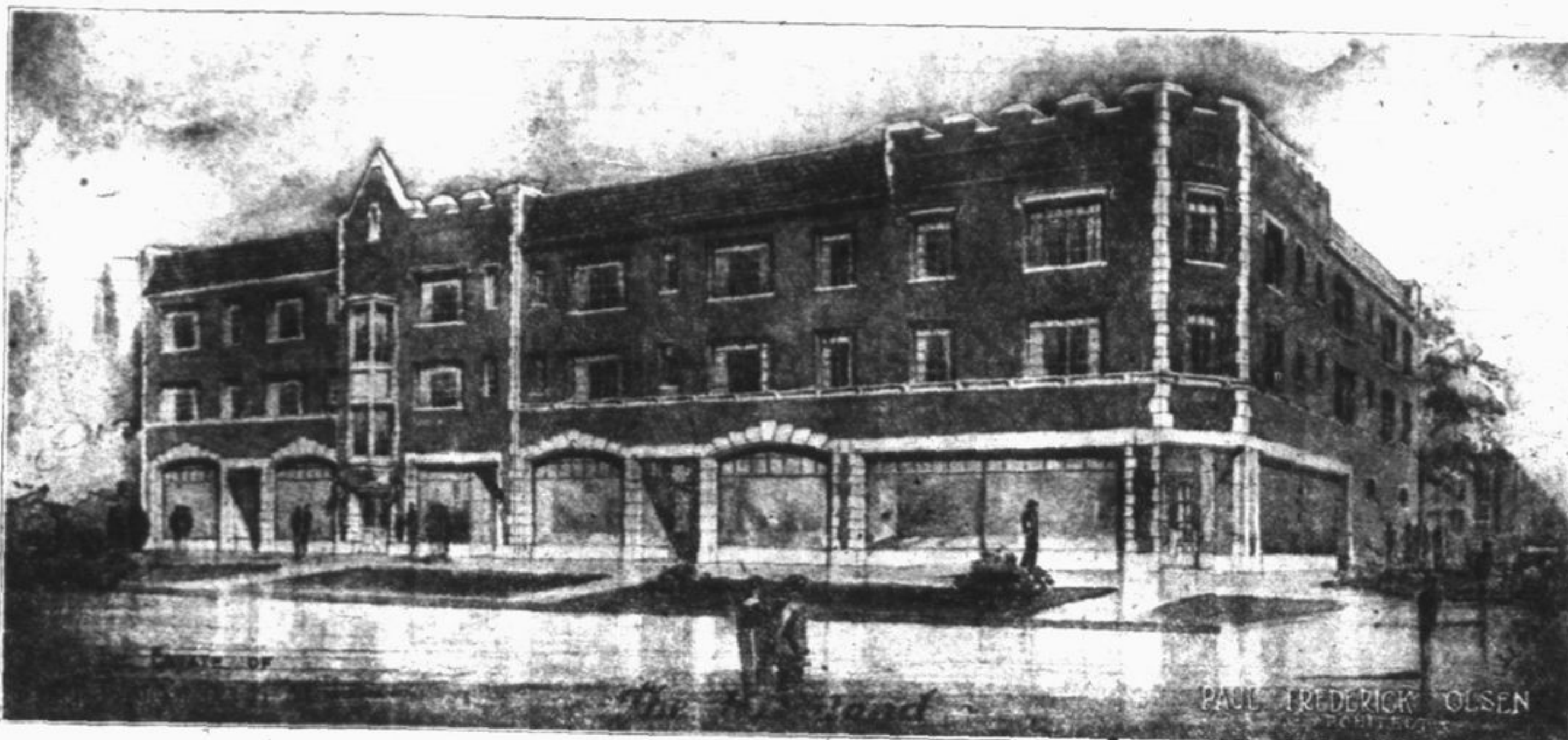
