MANY REVISIONS OF ZONING IN COUNTY

SUBDIVIDERS ARE URGENT

Take Matter Up With County Board and Latter Refers It to Committee to Report

After prolonged argument over alleged injustices of the county zoning laws to subdividers and lot owners the board of supervisors at their March meeting referred the problem to the plat committee and two attorneys to report back at the April reorganization session.

An informal organization of property owners, with Attorney E. M. Runyard and Judge Martin C. Decker as spokesmen, explained the proposed revision to the members of the board, stating that it had gone beyond the point where settlement with the plat committee was out of the question.

By Board Action
Supervisor Ed Mawman, Lake Bluff, chairman of the committee, felt that any alterations or revisions would be a matter of board action rather than of the committee.

One important change is demanded by the property owners. A clause in the zoning laws calls for a road on all section lines. This, Attorney Runyard argued, would be out of the question in some townships.

He cited, as illustrations, the swamp land district through the lake region where enormous sums would have to be expended before such a road could be used by traffic.

Says Law Invalid
Attorney Runyard reminded the board that the entire act was illegal and that it had been thrown out in Winnebago county through a ruling in the circuit court that was handed down by Judge C. C. Edwards while sitting in Rockford. There has been no Illinois legislation to sponsor such an act.

Two other restrictions placed by the zoning laws were hit by the attorney. He objected to the specifying of a building line and to the dictation of street widths.

This, he argued, was not resulting in what the board had hoped to bring about. Residents, he pointed out, of Chicago and other cities who purchased lake and river front property wanted all the freedom from laws allowed for their vacation period. They wished, he said, to build where they wanted without having to observe a building line that was more or less a meaningless action on the part of the board as far as the lake regions were concerned.

Street Width
It was also pointed out that street widths should be left more to the discretion of the committee and subdivider rather than being held to a law that was applied to the entire county.

The error of the act, as he pictured it, was that laws were made to govern all parcels of land through the county whereas it applied in some instances and was a decided misfit in others.

SEND TAX NOTICES OUT SOON, EXPECTED

County Treasurer Plans to Issue About 55,000 or More Bills Shortly

Within two weeks Treasurer Roy Bracher of Lake county will have approximately 55,000 to 60,000 tax statements in the mail for the taxpayers of the county, it was announced at his office last week.

The work of extending the 1926 tax has been completed by County Clerk Lew A. Hendee.

While there were 90,000 property descriptions on the books last year, there are about 102,000 this year or an increase of 12,000 parcels. A great part of this has come through the subdividing.

Collection of tax last year ranged near \$4,432,000 and the anticipated collection for this year will not exceed \$4,500,000 and more than likely will be about the same as it was in 1926.
