The remaining 10.8 per cent have neither. Forty per cent of the schools participating have courses in music history and appreciation That the percentage of these organizations which require the purchase of instruments and formal instruction should so much exceed that of general chorus work is significant and would point to a recognition of the superior merit of such training from the standpoints of character development and general culture.

Organized Recently

Fully 67 per cent of the bands reported in the survey had been organized in the last five years, while the number of orchestras that came in existence in the same period was only slightly over 36 per cent. The apparent trend toward bands is explained by the fact that to the 40.8 per cent of these schools already having orchestras, the organization of a band would be the next logical step in their music program. The oldest band uncovered by the survey was that of the Union high school, Red Bluff, California, where the band had been in existence for twenty years. The orchestra there followed five years later. The oldest orchestra centioned, on the other hand, was founded in 1886 at the Lancaster, Pennsylvania high school. Three years ago a band was started which now numbers 65 pieces.

Fifty-Piece Band

The survey also proved enlightening on the size of the school music organizations greatest in favor. Nat-

The size band most frequently reported is one ranging from 30 to 50 pieces, followed closely by bands ranging in memberships from 20 to 30 pieces. Ten to 20 pieces is the most popular for orchestra, although 20 to 30 pieces and 30/to 50 pieces are very common. UNIVERSAL TONGUE

East Director Sees Its Eventual Adoption by All Lands

The gradual adoption of English as universal language is predicted by Prof. George M. Wilcox, educational director of the Near East Relief, in

his annual report. His experience with 18,000 children boys only, 587 mixed, and 23 wholly of a half-dozen Near Eastern races, who are students in the orphanage There was almost no divergence of schools under his direction, leads him to the conviction that English, "provided it continues to produce a great literature and to avoid puristic comprications," will continue to extend its linguistic conquests.

"It has the advantage," he points cut, "of being an amalgam of several racial elements, and of easily absorbing serviceable words from other tongues, even the most remote. Although already an old language, it is still young in its flexibility and adaptability, and is recognized the world over as the language of free-


