JESSE L. SMITH LECTURES

**Addresses March Meeting of the
Glencoe P. T. A. on Nature
Subjects; Nominations
Are Made**

The March meeting of the Glencoe Parent-Teacher association was held on Monday, March 21, at the school gymnasium. Jesse L. Smith, superintendent of Highland Park schools, was the speaker of the evening at the March meeting of the Glencoe P.T.A. Mr. Smith told interesting adventures afield, illustrating his talk with stereopticon slides made from pictures he had taken in this vicinity. He pointed out spots of beauty in the Skokie, along the Desplaines, and even in groups of wayside plants commonly thought of only as weeds. He deplored the fact that many of these regions are being civilized out of existence. Mr. Smith left his audience fully convinced that a day with nature is one well spent. Mr. Smith stressed the need of conserving nature's beauties, and the foolishness of destroying them in behalf of the "front foot proposition."

The nominating committee's selections for the offices in the association were read. It suggested for president, Mrs. James Sheldon; vice-president, Mrs. F. W. Parker; second vice president, Miss Jane Gould; secretary, Miss Anna Bostrom; treasurer, Mrs. John Grant.

The next meeting of the association will be held at the Union church on April 26, at 3:30 o'clock. A nature pageant will be given under the direction of Mrs. Theron Colton of Chicago.

**STUDENTS IMPRESSED
WITH NASH FACTORY**

**Number from Great Lakes and
Elsewhere Visit Big Plant
Learn Much**

Inspection of the various operations entailed in the production of the Nash car was made last week by a delegation of fifty students of the Aviation corps of the Great Lakes Naval Training station under the supervision of Lieut. Commander Weiss. Like many universities and other institutions of learning in the central west, the Naval Training station has made inspection of the Nash plant, and other industrial plants, a part of the school curriculum.

Among the other schools to send students to the Nash factory, under the guidance of professor and instructors, are the University of Illinois, school of engineering; Northwestern university, school of commerce; University of Wisconsin; Armour Institute; Ohio Northern university; University of Kansas; University of Arkansas; Purdue university; Lake Forest college; University of Oklahoma, school of engineering; Greer College of Automobile Engineering, and a number of high schools.

**PLAN TO RESUME
BAHAI BUILDING**

**National Convention to Discuss
Plans to Provide Funds
For Operations**

Four new local bodies have recently been organized in North America to take an active part in Bahai work. The new assemblies are the Bahais of Vancouver, B. C.; St. Augustine, Fla.; Ithaca, N. Y.; and Wilmette. There are now forty-six local Bahai assemblies in the United States and Canada, and twenty-four groups lacking the requisite number entitling them to form assemblies and send delegates to the National Spiritual assembly.

To date nine National Spiritual assemblies are in existence, four in the Occident, composed of Aryans, the white race, namely: The States and Canada, Germany, Great Britain and Ireland, Caucasus.

The nineteenth annual convention of the Bahais of the United States and Canada will be held at Montreal toward the end of April.

North Shore citizens will be interested in learning that the ensuing national convention will devote attention to providing means for the resumption of construction work on the edifice which is located at Linden avenue and Sheridan road, Wilmette.

The public is invited to attend meetings for the elucidation of the Bahai teachings, Sunday afternoons at 3 o'clock, in the studio of Louis Bourgeois, the architect, at 536 Sheridan road. There is no charge for admission to Bahai meetings, nor are collections taken, it is explained.
