WANT STOP SIGN LIMIT REDUCED

The Glencoe village board at a special meeting last Wednesday evening, adopted a resolution to further the state-wide movement to obtain legislation lowering the population limit for municipalities who can designate "stop boulevards" from 7,500 to 2,500.

The Illinois Municipal league is sponsoring the movement. It is contended there are street intersections equally dangerous in villages with populations between 2,500 and 7,500 as there are in villages having a population of more than 7,500, and that this law would prove of great benefit to the public in general.

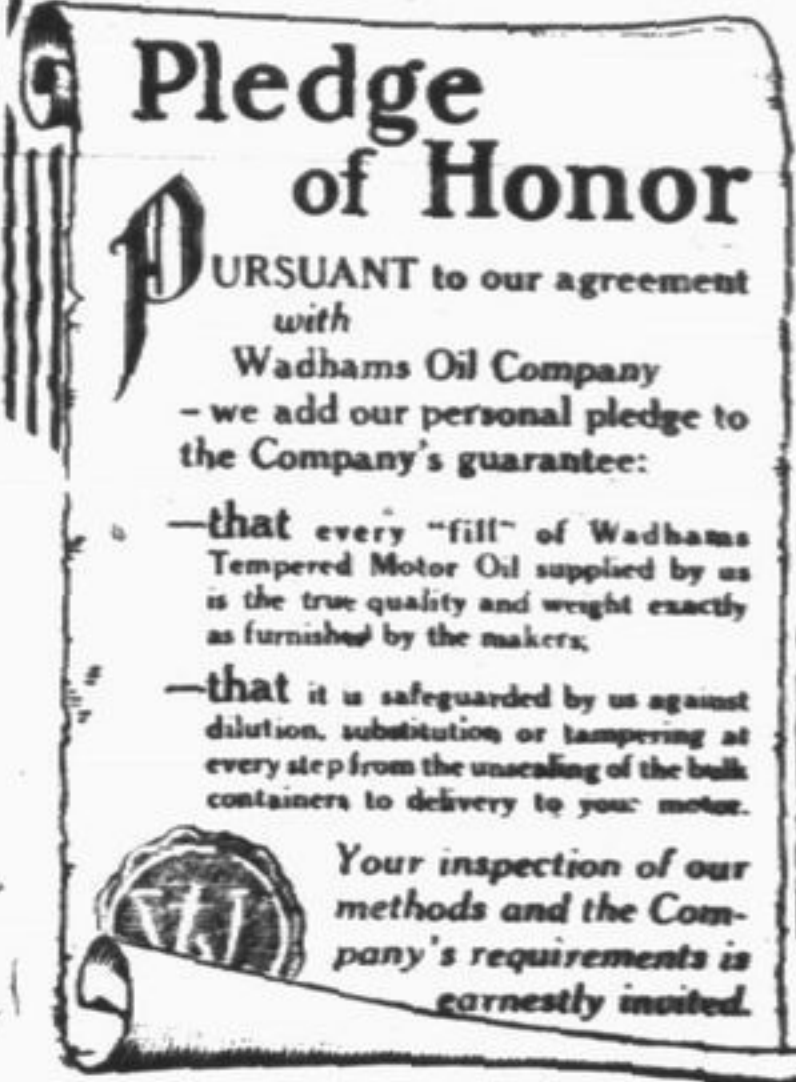
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
