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FORT SHERIDAN HORSE SHOW IS BIG SUCCESS

Indoor Military Exhibition Is Described by Post Writer; Many Thrills

(By James Fort Forsyth) Our appreciation of the Indoor Military Exhibition and Horse Show held in the riding hall at Fort Sheridan, Wednesday evening, April 6, was enhanced and interest in the events, enhanced to a considerable degree in that we shared a corner of the press box with Charles Ekmark, the Fort photographer.

Mr. Ekmark, a veteran trooper of "the good old days," at one time a sergeant of the "Dashing Fourteenth," was in his element throughout the show. "Trooping today is very much the same as in the days when I myself was one of the boys," said Mr. Ekmark, as he noted with the keen eye of a veteran photographer the various skillful sallies of the Fort Sheridan units.

There's that about a horse show under military auspices that makes it a "show among shows." The uniforms, the military band, the general dash, enthusiasm and color of the ensemble, all add materially to an atmosphere that is at once intriguing and thrilling. As one of the ladies from the Great Lakes Naval Training station, seated with her husband, a naval officer, was heard to remark: "John, the show in itself is marvelous, but - isn't the atmosphere just grand?"

Dignitaries from Sixth Corps Area headquarters in Chicago, including Major General William Lassiter and members of his staff, a goodly delegation of naval officers from Great Lakes, and prominent society folk of Highland Park and Chicago featured among the audience. The main floor seats, the balcony, the windows, all were occupied, to witness the "show of the season" in things equestrarian.

Thrills predominated throughout the entire program. Cavalry troops dashed through intricate maneuvers at breakneck speed, Field Artillery caissons, drawn by powerful horses and guided by skilled drivers reminded the spectator of Ben Hur, while the Second Infantry astonished the onlookers with wall scaling feats, silent drill, totally devoid of verbal command, and shattering volleys of rifle fire that afforded the "thrill seeker" an opportunity to satisfy his penchant.

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zoning ordinance at the present time and any outsider could erect a slaughter house, soap factory, oil filling station or round house anywhere in the City and the property owners could not prevent them from doing so. An example of this unrestricted zoning happened on Railroad and Prairie avenues. The zoning ordinance then in effect was drawn up by the city attorney but he failed to see that the clauses in it were carried out and after four years an out of town enterprise erected the oil filling station in the supposedly restricted territory. The city attorney for Highland did not interest himself enough to combat the case when it was heard in Waukegan. He promised to be at the trial but failed to appear and the City lost the case by default. A new iron clad zoning ordinance will be adopted immediately and the proper city attorney will be appointed to see that all provisions of it are carried out to comply with the law thereby making a recurrence of the above nature impossible.

Some time ago an inspection was made of all fire hydrants within the city and a report made that a number of them were out of order with broken shanks, defective valves, etc. No water could be pumped from them as the rods or shanks lifting the valves were broken or sheared off in the ground. This report was presented to the present mayor but no replacements have been made, the excuse being there was no funds available for these improvements. The Water department should be self-sustaining under proper management and improvements of this nature should be taken care of immediately. It is indeed very fortunate that no serious fire has broken out near any of these unserviceable hydrants as the houses would have burned to the ground before the water could be pumped from the nearest serviceable hydrant. The Progressive Citizens' Party if elected will see that all hydrants are in perfect order and not make excuses as to why they cannot be repaired.

The Party believes in equal rights and protection for all Highland residents and will carry out this belief to the utmost. There appeared in a recent issue of the Press an article praising the present mayor for his accomplishments while in office; also stating he was in hearty co-operation with the Highland Civic Improvement Assn. Whoever made this assertion told an untruth. If ever a person was antagonistic toward an association organized for civic welfare of this community it was the mayor. He never sanctioned any suggestion made to him by this association; on the contrary he refused to grant them permission to make and pay for improvements to benefit the City. The majority of the members of the Civic Improvement Assn. are endorsing the Progressive Citizens' Party, they knowing the antagonistic attitude of the present mayor toward the association.
