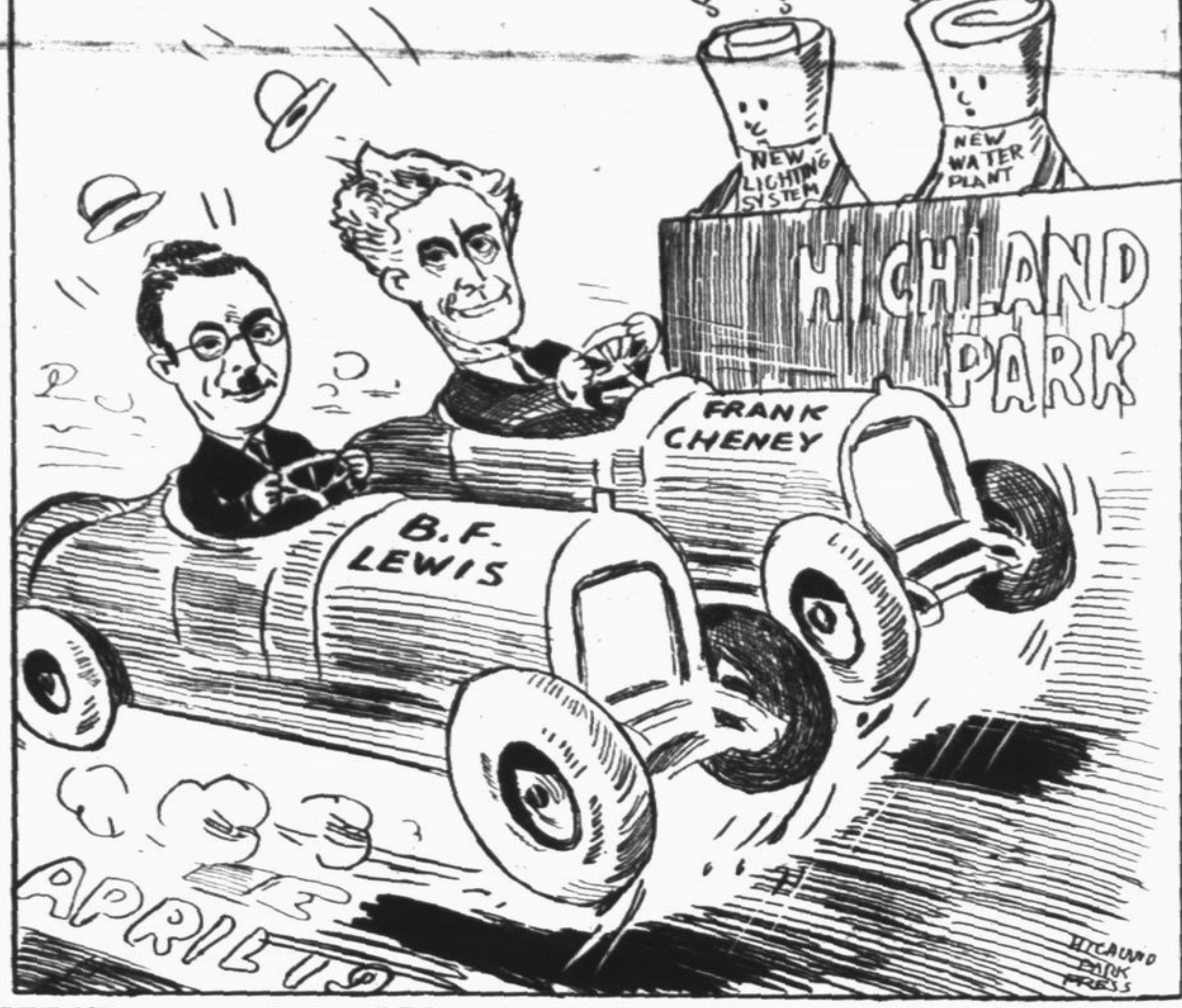

HARD ROAD WORK TO BE STARTED SHORTLY

County Supt. Reports Good Progress Made In Preliminary Matters

R. M. Lobdell, acting county highway superintendent, reports that most of the needed right-of-ways for three county roads, Ivanhoe-Grayslake, Milburn, and Long Lake-Round Lake, have been obtained and that within the next few weeks advertisements for bids will be placed. He hopes to have contracts led for part of the work in May.

The acting county highway superintendent says that the present plan is to have the Ivanhoe-Grayslake and Milburn roads this year and the Long Lake-Round Lake road next year. He says however that an effort will be made to have the grading done this summer on the latter road.

Regarding the paving of section 105, of State Route 59, one of the Lake county roads to be paved out of the \$100,000,000 road bond issue, Mr. Lobdell says work will probably start within the next few weeks. The contract was awarded to the Frank C. Feutz company of Rochester, Ind., yesterday by the state highway department. The bid of this firm was \$106,986.69. Mr. Lobdell says that he understands that the Feutz company will probably sublet the grading work on this job.

COUNTY COMMITTEE TO CHOOSE DELEGATES

The Lake county republican central committee will meet on Friday of this week. Probably in the court house, to select delegates to the judicial convention of the seventeenth judicial circuit to be held on April 16. At the convention three candidates for the circuit bench will be named.

According to every indication the sitting judges will be re-nominated without opposition. They are Claire C. Edwards of Waukegan, Edward D. Shurtleff of Marengo, and Co. Arthur A. Fisher of Rockford. They have the support of the bar association of all counties in the district. The election is to be held on June 6.

Lake county will have 39 delegates at the convention, while Winnebago will have 43 delegates, and Boone, 20 delegates. Each county will also select the same number of alternates.

CLAIM DOG'S BARK SAVED THEIR LIVES

The barking of a bulldog saved the lives of Mr. and Mrs. V. W. Bean of 133 North Victory street, Waukegan, when their home caught fire recently. The fire started from a pile of oil-soaked rags on the kitchen floor. Awakened from their deep slumber by the loud and persistent barking of the dog, Mr. and Mrs. Bean found their apartment filled with smoke. They believe they would have been suffocated had it not been for the dog.

George Beall, Sr., old and highly respected resident of Zion fell dead on the street in front of his home recently while he was conversing with two friends. His death was believed due to heart failure. He was 55 years of age.

REFUSES CHARTER TO NEW WAUKEGAN BANK

State Auditor Also Gives Out Statement Explaining Cause of Action

Refusal on the part of Oscar Nelson, state auditor, to grant a charter to the Bankers' Trust Company of Waukegan, has caused E. A. Curtis, the petitioner, to abandon his plans. Announcement that the charter has been denied was made today by the state auditor.

Explaining his position Mr. Nelson said, in part: "I refused to grant a charter because I feel that at least a year or so should elapse following the Security Bank crash to allow the other banks to liquidate its assets, and that to allow a new bank or trust company to come in now would tend to hinder the work of those who labored so hard to straighten out the Security tangle, and therefore I felt they were entitled to some consideration and even protection."

"A new bank or even trust company, coming into the field just now might undo much of the good work already done. Furthermore, its own career, in view of the other failure, might be precarious. And thus, in view of all these circumstances, I refused the petition."

LAKE CO. CORONER HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Dr. John L. Taylor, Lake county coroner, had a very narrow escape from serious injury and his car was almost totally wrecked recently when, as he was turning out to pass a truck near Bradley road on the Rockland road, he nicked the truck and plunged into a ditch crashing up against a telephone pole. Dr. Taylor was on his way back to Libertyville. He apparently misjudged the distance around the truck and just barely touched it. Dr. Taylor was not injured.

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BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity; County Seat Doings

All arrangements for the erection building at the corner of Washington of the proposed nine story hotel and Utica streets, Waukegan, at a cost of more than \$500,000 have been completed by the architects.

Impersonating federal prohibition officers, two armed blackmailers recently "raided" the home of John Lamovec on Dugdale road and by making threats on his life, succeeded in getting Lamovec to give them \$1,000.

The Rev. Peter Joseph Burke, seminarian at St. Mary's of the Lake, Mundelein, died last week at St. Bernard's hospital in Chicago of appendicitis. He is survived by his parents, two brothers and three sisters.

More than 40 industrial concerns in Waukegan and North Chicago are being included in the organization of Division "C" of the Community Chest workers prepared for the annual campaign during the last week of April.

Plans of the North Shore Gas company to erect a monster addition to the plant of the concern on the North Flats, work to start within a month were reported last week. The addition, which will greatly increase the capacity of the plant will cost more than \$500,000 it is understood.

The three youths, George and Edward Amen and Roy Hironimus, who confessed to stealing 125 chickens from Roy Seymour of Wauconda, were held to the October session of the grand jury by Justice Charles E. Mason.

The case of Ignatz Potz, sentenced in Lake county to hang in 1922, but whose sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Small, and then reduced to eight years and three months, may have further action taken upon it at the April session of the state supreme court, which opened last week.

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
