PLAN INCREASES IN SOME ASSESSMENTS

Assessed valuation of lots in subdivisions in the lake district will be increased 50 per cent by assessors this year, revaluation year, while there will be a 5 percent increase in valuations on lots in Waukegan and along the north shore as far as Lake county is concerned. This announcement was made last week, after a supervisors' room in the courthouse, meeting of assessors held in the courthouse.

Regarding farm land, it was stated the assessors decided that there should be little or no increase in valuations in cases where the land is actually used for farming purposes. The assessors were all of the opinion that there be an increase in valuation of lake subdivision lots, a small increase in lots on the north shore, while in regard to land used for farming it was felt that the owners could not stand any higher assessments.

The meeting of assessors was held for the purpose of deciding on a more or less uniform assessment plan, so that all will be treated alike and an agreement was reached without any difficulty, according to County Treasurer Roy Bracher, who presided.

TARANTULA BITES WOMAN IN FINGER

Libertyville Saleslady Suffers Unusual Injury; Is Recovering

Mrs. Cora Taylor, who is employed at the Libertyville branch of the Atlantic and Pacific Tea company, is reported as recovered from the effects of the bite of a tarantula, more commonly known as the banana spider, which came all the way from the tropics in a nest in a bunch of bananas.

On Thursday morning, last week, Mrs. Taylor was cutting bananas from a bunch which had just been brought from the basement of the store and when she reached under the bottom of the stock she felt a sensation in her finger which she described as being similar to the sting of a bee.

Almost immediately the poison spread to her shoulder and the arm became discolored. Her finger became snow-white and her eyesight materially affected.

She was taken to the office of Drs. Taylor and Penney where treatment was given. A most fortunate coincidence was the presence in Libertyville of Dr. Lucas, who had spent several years in Cuba and South America as a special investigator for the United States government in the study of insect bites and their cures. On learning of the case he advised the proper emergency treatment and this was administered hypodermically.

Mrs. Taylor was taken to her home and for the remainder of the day suffered severe pains from the effects of the poison. She was reported as much better Friday. The discoloration had receded from the arm but the injured finger was still stiff.

The spider, which was a full grown specimen, was found later in the vegetables over which the bananas hung, and was killed. The nest in the bottom of the bunch of fruit contained a newly hatched brood of these unwelcome visitors.

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PLAN TO REVISE COUNTY ZONING

Supervisor Ray Paddock, retiring chairman of the board of supervisors reports that at the conference of county board committee last week it was decided to have Robert Kingery, secretary of the Chicago Regional and Planning association revise present zoning regulations. He was at the meeting and agreed to submit a draft of changes possible to the committee at a meeting on April 15.

The committee will either make a report to the board, recommending changes in zoning, at the re-organization meeting on April 21 or the meeting the following week, when committees are named for the year by the new chairman.

Supervisor Paddock says that chief among the changes which are contemplated is in regard to roads in subdivisions in the lake region. At the present time the regulations provide that roads must be laid out on section and cross section lines. Many times roads have had to be laid out in swamps because of this rule and a change will probably be made providing that roads be laid out in the best possible manner, the zoning committee having the power to make a decision in this matter.
