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SEVERSON RETURNED AS HIGHWOOD MAYOR

ELECTION RESULT MIXED

One Alderman on Peoples Ticket and Two on Progressive Win; Progressive Clerk and Treasurer

In the annual city election in Highwood on Tuesday, Mayor Joseph Severson, candidate on the Peoples ticket, was returned to office with a mixed council, one candidate for alderman on the Peoples ticket and two on the Progressive ticket being elected. Progressive candidates for city clerk and city treasurer also were elected. Mayor Severson's majority, according to the unofficial count Tuesday evening, was 13, over Robert Botner the candidate for mayor on the Progressive ticket.

The election was a warm one throughout, with plenty of activity on both sides and workers busy for both sides all day. Nearly 800 votes were cast for the heads of the tickets.

Details of Election

John Simpson, candidate for city clerk on the Progressive ticket was elected with a total of 347 votes, defeating J. F. Leonardi, Peoples ticket. Continued on page 5

Highland Park Club Elects Officers at Its Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Highland Park club was held on Saturday, April 16. Dinner was served at 6:30 and the meeting was called to order for business at 8 o'clock. About fifty members were present and after the regular routine business, Mr. R. A. Wood, retiring vice-president, made a talk, complimenting Mr. Lewis on his conduct of the club affairs for the past season.

Mr. Wood pointed out that in his four years' service on the board, this was the first year that a gain in membership had been shown. The club accepted thirty new members this season, and had resignations from nineteen, thus leaving a net gain of eleven members. Other members reported that they considered the season just closed one of the most successful in the history of the club. Mr. Lewis was especially commended for the high class entertainment supplied and for the inaugurating of the Monday evening stags.

Mr. Lewis expressed regret that he could not accept the nomination offered him for another year inasmuch as he had taken on other duties and felt that the work would be too great. Following the business meeting, the election of officers for the coming season took place. Mr. James S. Marsh was elected president; Mr. Brooke Anderson, first vice-president; Mr. Thomas H. Sheridan, second vice-president; and Mr. R. K. O'Hara as treasurer. The board members are Messrs. R. W. Neumann, Nathan Corwith, Jr., R. H. Walker, Blaine S. Smith, and M. J. Traub. Although the annual meeting marks the official closing of the season, there will be a closing dinner dance on Saturday evening of this week.

JOHN SWEENEY DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME

LIFELONG RESIDENT HERE

Son of Pioneer Family and Well Known Citizen Passes Away Monday; Brief Sketch of Life; Funeral

John A. Sweeney, a resident of this vicinity during all his life of 62 years, and a son of one of the earliest pioneer families of this part of Lake county, died suddenly at 3:30 o'clock Monday afternoon, at his home, 18 McGovern street. Death was attributed to cerebral hemorrhage. An inquiry was held Tuesday by Coroner Taylor.

Mr. Sweeney was born March 10, 1865, on the old Sweeney homestead, north of Highland Park, which property is now partly in Old Elm club grounds, and partly in Krenn & Dato's Highland Park Gardens subdivision. His father, Michael Sweeney came to this vicinity in 1844, and John Sweeney was his eldest son.

The Family

In June, 1902, John Sweeney married Delia Hastings, who survives, and there are living three children, Miss Mary E. Sweeney, who is assistant postmaster at Fort Sheridan; John M. Sweeney, connected with the express business in Highland Park, and Miss Margaret L. Sweeney, who is a student in Rosary college at Riverside, Ill.

Other near relatives living are the following brother and sisters: William W. and Miss Ellen Sweeney, who reside on the old homestead, near Fort Sheridan; Mrs. M. W. Driscoll and Mrs. J. T. Moody of Highland Park; Mrs. J. J. O'Malley, Chicago; Mrs. T. P. Brady, Joliet. There are three nieces and three nephews.

Mr. Sweeney was a lifelong and active member of the Immaculate Conception church of Highland Park. He had lived here, since 1909, though he sold it four years ago. He was also a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters and was always interested in civic affairs and everything which contributed to the welfare and improvement of his home city.

Had Many Friends

In Highland Park and vicinity Mr. Sweeney had a host of warm friends by whom he was held in highest regard because of his many fine qualities. He was a good citizen, good neighbor and loyal friend, and his sudden death is deeply regretted by the entire community. The relatives have the sincere sympathy of their many friends in their sad bereavement.

The funeral service was held at 9 o'clock this morning, at the Immaculate Conception church and was attended by a large number of friends and relatives, and the tribute of flowers was extensive and beautiful. The sisters and nephews and nieces who live in other cities, as well as the local relatives, were in attendance. Burial was in the Everett cemetery.

ELECT LEWIS MAYOR BY 227 GOURLEY, ZIMMER, REAY, BROWN

IS BIGGEST VOTE IN HISTORY OF HIGHLAND PARK

City Election on Tuesday Is Mixed Victory; More Than 4,300 Votes Are Polled; Lewis' Majority Is 227; Totals for Candidates and Vote by Precincts

Benjamin F. Lewis was elected mayor of Highland Park for the next four years in Tuesday's city election. His majority over Frank L. Cheney, according to the latest unofficial figures, is 227. Commissioners elected are W. J. Brown, Lyle Gourley, William Reay and Julius Zimmer.

The result of the election is a mixed victory, with the "Time for a Change" party electing a mayor and one commissioner, and the Coalition ticket electing three commissioners, indicating once more that the average American voter as a rule does not vote consistently.

Record Vote Polled

The election was one of the hottest political battles in the history of Highland Park, a total of over 4300 votes cast, breaking all records. There was much excitement throughout the day and one or two personal encounters, but in general it was a very orderly election, with everybody working hard for the respective candidates, and the streets filled with automobiles hurrying voters to the polls in the several precincts.

The total unofficial vote for mayor was: Lewis 2290, Cheney 2063. The total vote for commissioners: Gourley, 2389; Zimmer, 2239; Reay, 2192;

Brown, 2077; Bosworth, 2022; Oliver, 2021; Mrs. Hopkins, 1898; Krumbach, 1790.

Vote in Primary

In the primary election the total vote for each candidate was: Lewis, 1717; Cheney, 1172; Gourley, 1725; Oliver, 1539; Reay, 1304; Zimmer, 1255; Brown, 1022; Krumbach, 1011; Mrs. Hopkins, 960; Bosworth, 505.

Gourley Runs Ahead

Commissioner Gourley, as will be seen from the above figures, again led the voting. He polled the largest vote in the primary and also in the election last Tuesday, for commissioner. For commissioner in the primary, Bosworth was eighth in the number of votes polled, and in the election he was fifth. Brown was fifth in the primary and fourth in the election. Mrs. Hopkins was seventh in each instance; Krumbach was sixth in the primary and eighth in the election. Continued on page 5
