SEVERSON RETURNED AS HIGHWOOD MAYOR

ELECTION RESULT MIXED

One Alderman on Peoples Ticket and Two on Progressive Win; Progressive Clerk and Treasurer

In the annual city election in Highwood on Tuesday, Mayor Joseph Severson, candidate on the Peoples ticket, was returned to office with a mixed council, one candidate for alderman on the Peoples ticket and two on the Progressive ticket being elected. Progressive candidates for city clerk and city treasurer also were elected. Mayor Severson's majority, according to the unofficial count Tuesday evening, was 13, over Robert Botner the candidate for mayor on the Progressive ticket.

The election was a warm one throughout, with plenty of activity on both sides and workers busy for both sides all day. Nearly 800 votes were cast for the heads of the tickets.

Details of Election John Simpson, candidate for city clerk on the Progressive ticket was elected with a total of 347 votes, defeating J. F. Leonardi, Peoples ticket Continued on page 5


Special Ceremony April 14 In **Highland Park Highlands** of Interest
