Projects that eventually will be resolved into completed works, purposes and policies that in time to come must be adopted and financed, if accepted in their entirety today would throw a tax burden upon the people that would cripple business, check prosperity, and convert our annual deficit. What needs to be done should be done For extravagance and unnecessary provision there is no justification. I intend always to recommend sufficient appropriation to do what is necessary to be done. If I err in my judgment, I prefer to err on the side of saving rather than on the side of spending'."
