TO LEGALIZE SCHOOL NURSES' EMPLOYMENT

Rep. Weiss Offers Bill to That Effect In Legislature Last Week

The movement to permit the employment of school nurses was brought up from a new point of attack by Representative Weiss last week when he introduced a measure permitting the employment by boards of education.

Senator Swift had a bill passed in the upper chamber some weeks ago permitting school nurses to be employed by school directors, but when the measure reached second reading in the house, it was moved to strike out the enacting clause, and the success of this motion made the bill worthless.

The Weiss bill gives the plan a new lease on life, and if the Waukegan legislator can push his bill through the house, the already expressed sentiment on the school nurse proposition should insure the measure's passage.

TWO CANDIDATES FOR CHAIRMAN OF BOARD

Holdridge, Waukegan, Thompson of Benton Seek to Head Supervisors, Report

After a two hour conference with Supervisor-elect Matt Dilger of Waukegan and Supervisor Obee of Highland Park, Supervisor Ira Holdridge of Waukegan last week agreed to become a candidate for chairman of the county board when it meets for organization Thursday, April 21, according to the Waukegan Sun, which says:

"The fact that Mr. Obee is not to be a candidate is a matter of interest in the organization of the board. It developed following the conference in Waukegan on Tuesday that Mr. Obee insisted on stepping aside in order to give way to Mr. Holdridge and permit the contest for the chairmanship to sift down to the two men—Holdridge of Waukegan and Supervisor B. C. Thompson of Benton township.

"And thus in view of Mr. Holdridge's decision that he will be a candidate, it means that the battle is on from now until the 21st between him and Mr. Thompson.

"Mr. Obee in reaching his decision that he would not be a candidate declared that he felt that it is Waukegan's turn to have the chairmanship as Highland Park has had it since it had been given to Waukegan. Mr. Obee inferred when he stepped aside this year to give way to Holdridge that he would likely be a candidate himself next year."

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
