IOWA TO CO-OPERATE IN GAME PRESERVATION

So Illinois Legislators Are Informed; Other Mississippi States, Too

Illinois legislators in a recent conference with Gov. John Hamill, members of his cabinet, and Iowa legislators at Des Moines were assured of the co-operation of Iowa in an plan to secure uniform fish and game conservation laws for states bordering the Mississippi river. Senator Earl B. Searcy, chairman of the Illinois joint commission; Director William J. Stratton of the state department of conservation; and Representatives John Acker of Savanna, Truman A. Snell of Carlinville, and James Reeves of Champaign were the legislators who attended the conference. A similar conference with Wisconsin officials at Madison is planned.
