ARDEN SHORE CAMP HISTORY AND WORK

Largest Charity Summer Camp In World; Benefits Children and Mothers

Arden Shore, a camp for mothers and children, is one of the largest fresh air camps in the world. It is located on a high wooded bluff, overlooking Lake Michigan, about 35 miles north of Chicago. There are some 22 acres of land with a frontage of 300 feet on the lage. The property is owned by the Arden Shore association, an incorporated body with a charter from the state of Illinois, this week, Saturday, April 30, at 11 and is entirely free of debt. Many beautiful buildings have been given to the camp, most of them as memorials. Screened cottages are provided for all campers.

The camp was started in 1901 by Mrs. Leila Moss Martin, the founder of Gads Hill Settlement in Chicago, and was originally called Gads Hill camp.
