## ARDEN SHORE CAMP HISTORY AND WORK

### Largest Charity Summer Camp in World; Benefits Children and Mothers

Arden Shore, a camp for mothers and children, is one of the largest fresh air camps in the world. It is located on a high wooded bluff, overlooking Lake Michigan, about 35 miles north of Chicago. There are some 22 acres of land with a frontage of 300 feet on the lake. The property is owned by the Arden Shore association, an incorporated body with a charter from the state of Illinois, and is entirely free of debt. Many beautiful buildings have been given to the camp, most of them as memorials. Screened cottages are provided for all campers.

The camp was started in 1901 by Mrs. Lella Moss Martin, the founder of Gads Hill Settlement in Chicago, and was originally called Gads Hill camp. It was first located in Glenoc on land loaned for the purpose. In 1908 when this land was no longer available the present tract was purchased and the name changed to Arden Shore in order to avoid confusion in the minds of subscribers.

In the beginning only 30 guests could be accommodated at one time

I believe it is a very necessary part of the hospital equipment to have a class of blood donors in time of need. Therefore, the Highland Park hospital offers this opportunity for healthy young people between ages of 18 and 40 years to aid in the saving.

## FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL MONDAY

### IS AT 7:30 IN EVENING

### New-Elected Officers to Take Seats; Three Already Have Filed Bonds; Retiring Council Meets

The first meeting of the new city council will be held at 7:30 o'clock Monday evening of next week, at which time the new mayor and commissioners elected for the ensuing four years will take their seats. Meetings thereafter will be on each Friday at 8 p. m. Bonds had been filed early Wednesday afternoon by Commissioners-elect Reay, Brown and Zimmer, and Mayor-elect Lewis and Commissioner-elect Gourley were expected to file theirs in time to qualify before the county court, as all of them are required to do by law, before the initial meeting. Each bond is in the sum of \$3,000. Bonds have been sent to all for execution.

At the regular meeting of the city council last Friday evening the vote in the city election April 19 was formally canvassed, with the following result as given by the official figures, as the names appeared on the ballot:

## MRS. A. R. CARQUEVILLE FUNERAL ON SATURDAY

### Well Known Woman Passes Away April 20; Daughter of Founder of Nash Co.

Mrs. Eva Jeffery Carqueville, wife of A. R. Carqueville, well known and highly regarded resident of Highland Park for many years, died Wednesday evening, April 20, following a two years illness, aged 49 years.

She was born in Chicago July 12, 1878, and came to Highland Park in 1910, and from that time with the exception of three years spent in Chicago and traveling, she had resided in this city where she had a host of devoted friends by whom her loss is greatly beloved and by whom her loss is deeply mourned.

Mrs. Carqueville was eldest daughter of the late Thomas B. Jeffery, former president of the Thomas B. Jeffery Co. of Kenosha, Wis., the predecessor of the present Nash Automobile Co. She was a member of the Presbyterian church and interested in civic affairs and things of benefit to the community.

She is survived by her husband, Alexander R. Carqueville, and two children, Jeffery A. Carqueville and Mrs. Katherine Stevens.

The funeral service was held Saturday, April 23, at 2 o'clock at the family residence, the Rev. Frank Pitt officiating, and burial was in the North Shore cemetery.
