Boy Scout Music
The Elmhurst boy scout drum and bugle corps will furnish music. This group of 35 scouts has been practicing on selections especially for this gathering and the program committee assures an interesting night.

One of the features of the evening's program will be the selection of the nearest troop from the 31 competing, to receive the honor award.

When a first class scout begins working on merit badges he becomes particularly interested in pamphlets on various vocational merit badge subjects. In these merit badge pamphlets, issued by the Boy Scouts of America, are brought together the practical information on carpentry, conservation, forestry, and dozens of other merit badge subjects.

The Highland Park public library last week added a supply of these merit badge pamphlets for the use of scouts and other boys who are interested in "how to do" and "how to make" fields.

Progress of Cabin
Boy scouts from the various troops of the north shore will meet at the council cabin west of Glencoe, now under construction, on Saturday morning, May 7, at 10 a.m. to plant a hundred young seedlings. These pines are to be named after the various troops of the council.

The name of "Camp Scout Haven" has been suggested. Other names are being suggested by scouts and friends. Several troops are running contests for the naming of the weekend camp.

Although the logs are only up 6 or 7 feet high, and the date of dedication is not yet decided upon, many troops are hiking to the site and looking over the layout. They agree that it will become a regular "scout haven."

"Everlasting Punishment" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, May 1.

The Golden Text was from Proverbs 3:11, "My son, despise not the chastening of the Lord; neither be weary of his correction."

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God: and not that he should return from his ways, and live? Cast away from you all your transgressions, whereby ye have transgressed; and make you a new heart and a new spirit: for why will ye die, O house of Israel? For I have no pleasure in the death of him that dieth, saith the Lord God: wherefore turn yourselves, and live ye" (Ezek. 18:23, 31-42).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "To the physical senses, the strict demands of Christian Science seem pre-emptory; but mortals are hastening to learn that evil has in reality neither place nor power in the human or the divine economy" (p. 327).

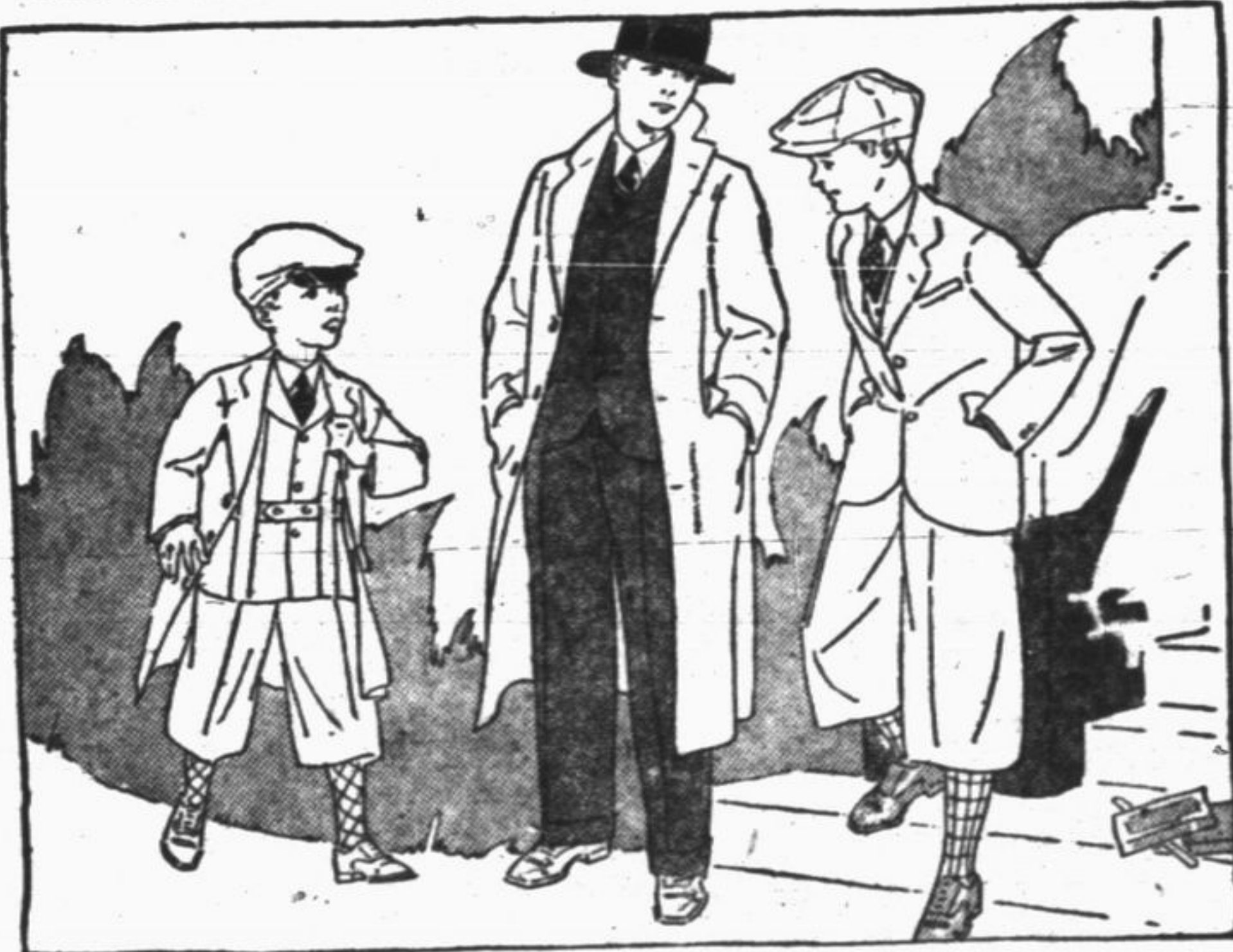
