SEVERAL DEATHS IN LAST WEEK REPORTED

Two at Fort Sheridan; One at Rail Men's Home; Little Girl Passes

Sergeant Elwin S. Hill, who has been at Fort Sheridan several years at different times died there April 27, aged 45 years. He had returned to his post from Kenosha only a week previously. Pulmonary tuberculosis was given as the cause of death. The body was shipped to Philadelphia for burial. He was unmarried.

William Delaney, who had been in the Railroad Men's Home for 17 or 18 years, died there April 28, aged 58 years, nine months and 27 days. The funeral service was held at the Immaculate Conception church, here, on Saturday morning, and burial was in All Saints cemetery, near Des Plaines.

Anna Louise Schultz, an army nurse for twenty years, died April 30 at the Fort Sheridan hospital, where she had given faithful service for a long time. The funeral was held Tuesday, and burial was in the post cemetery.

Cynthia Ann Drum, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Drum of Lincoln avenue, died Sunday, May 1, aged six months and 29 days. Burial was on Tuesday at Graceland cemetery.
