

**FIRST MEETING OF
NEW CITY COUNCIL**

gineer be considered and that the combining of an engineering department and the building department be also considered with the thought in mind that considerable money could be saved by so doing.

It will be necessary for you to elect at this meeting superintendents for the various departments and I want to recommend very strongly that—

Mr. Lyle Gourley be elected superintendent of the department of accounts and finances. I believe that the large vote cast for Mr. Gourley in the recent election signifies the confidence that the people have in him and the approval of his efforts during the past four years. He is the only member of the present council who has served four years in the council of Highland Park and I believe this is a further reason. During the past four years he was absent from only 8 meetings out of 149 and I believe this department needs a man who can give the necessary time to it. The superintendent of this department is acting mayor in the absence of the mayor and the fact that Mr. Gourley's business keeps him in Highland Park would be greatly in his favor.

I suggest that the medical staff at the Highland Park hospital be requested to suggest the names of at least three and not to exceed seven Highland Park physicians who would be willing to act as commissioners of the board of health.

On motion of Commissioner Gourley the message was received and placed on file.

The mayor then announced that nominations for superintendents of departments were in order.

Supts. of Departments
Mayor Lewis nominated Commissioner Lyle Gourley to be superintendent of the department of accounts and finance. Commissioner Brown nominated Commissioner Reay for the same. There being no further nominations, the clerk was instructed to call the roll on the motion to elect Commissioner Gourley to this office. The motion was lost, the vote being as follows: Yeas, Lewis, Gourley; nays, Brown, Reay, Zimmer.

The clerk then called the roll on the motion to elect Commissioner Reay superintendent of accounts and finance. The motion carried, the vote being as follows: Yeas, Brown, Reay, Zimmer; nays, Lewis, Gourley.

Commissioner Zimmer moved to elect Commissioner W. J. Brown to be superintendent of the department of streets and public improvements. The motion carried with all voting favorably.

Commissioner Reay moved the election of Commissioner Zimmer to be superintendent of the department of public health and safety. The motion was carried unanimously.

Mayor Lewis moved to elect Commissioner Gourley to be superintendent of the department of public property. The motion carried, with all voting favorably.

Mayor Lewis offered a motion to the effect that V. C. Musser be elected city clerk for a term of four years, beginning May 2, 1927, to succeed Edward A. Warren, whose term had expired, the salary not to exceed \$3,600 per annum, the exact amount of said salary to be fixed by the annual appropriation bill for the city. The motion carried unanimously.

Corporation Counsel
Mayor Lewis introduced and moved adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, it has been stated by ex-Mayor Hasting from the platform at a recent public meeting that Samuel S. Holmes, corporation counsel of the city of Highland Park, had tendered his resignation, which he had not accepted, and

Now, therefore, to promote the proper, efficient and economical conduct

of the business of the city's affairs,

Be it resolved, that the office of corporation counsel of the city of Highland Park be declared open at this date. The motion failed to carry, the vote being: Yeas, Lewis, Gourley, nays, Brown, Reay, Zimmer.

Suggests Commission
Mayor Lewis presented and moved adoption of the following resolution:

Be it resolved that the mayor appoint a commission of five, including himself, for the purpose of investigating the effect, efficiency and economy of a specially trained person acting as a city manager in cities where a city manager is employed, in cities with similar conditions and population as Highland Park, together with salaries paid, and report to the city council their findings and recommendations as to the advisability of employing such a person for Highland Park; that said commission shall consist of five members, three of whom shall be city officials and two citizens, and that the mayor shall be chairman of said commission. The vote on the resolution, which failed to carry, was: Yeas, Lewis, Gourley; nays, Brown, Reay, Zimmer.

Filtration Plant

Mayor Lewis presented and Commissioner Reay moved adoption of the following resolution:

Be it resolved that the mayor appoint a commission of five to investigate the cost of installation of a modern filtration plant that would be sufficient for the water supply of the city of Highland Park, together with a plan of financing the same, with recommendation that such commission shall consist of five members, three city officials and two other members,

the mayor to be chairman of the commission, and report to the council at its earliest convenience. The vote in favor of the motion was unanimous.

Mayor Lewis presented and Commissioner Gourley moved adoption of the following resolution.

Be it resolved that the medical staff of the Highland Park hospital be requested to recommend to the mayor not less than three nor more than seven physicians who are willing to act as commissioners of the board of health of the city of Highland Park; also one or more persons who would be candidates for the office of visiting nurse of said city. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Mayor Lewis introduced and Commissioner Gourley moved adoption of the following ordinance:

An ordinance to abolish the payment of extra compensation to city officials over and above their fixed salaries. The vote on the motion, which failed to carry, was: Yeas, Lewis, Gourley; nays, Brown, Reay, Zimmer. A motion to adjourn was then made and carried unanimously.
