### Deerfield Sub-Committee Assists in Work to Increase Funds for Arden Shore

A concerted effort in a house to house canvass, is being made by the Deerfield sub-committee of the civic committee of the Highland Park Woman's club, for the drive for Arden Shore that is now in progress, and of which Mrs. Chas. E. Timson is the chairman for Deerfield. A meeting was held at her home on Monday morning.

The Arden Shore is a camp for under-nourished children located at Lake Bluff, Ill. In the summer 500 persons at a time, mothers and children from the congested parts of Chicago are given a vacation.

Arden Shore is not only a summer camp but keeps open house in cold weather. It cares for and scientifically builds up from seventy-five to a hundred undernourished boys who have been refused work certificates.

The camp is maintained by popular subscription and there are no paid solicitors or workers except the regular staff at the camp.

One hundred dollars puts a boy through the winter camp and helps make him a self-supporting citizen. \$50 keeps a mother and a baby at the camp all summer. \$25 keeps one child at camp all summer. \$10 keeps a mother and baby at camp two weeks. \$5 keeps two children at camp one week.

### DEERFIELD P. T. A. IS AT CLOSE OF SEASON

Annual Meeting to Be Held May 13; at Public Library; To Give Reports

The Deerfield Parent-Teacher association is closing one of its most successful years under the leadership of the president, Mrs. H. G. Cazal, and the efforts of the program committee, of which Mrs. C. W. Getty is chairman.

The Deerfield School P. T. A. has fulfilled its obligations to the state in paying its ten cents per capita tax, by observing Founder's day and sending a donation of money collected in the February meeting to the National Congress of Mothers and Teachers for the extension of its work.

Delegates have been sent to the Illinois Council of Parent-Teacher associations conference in Quincy in April, to the fifth regional conference of district nineteen which includes Cook county (outside of Chicago) and Lake county, held in the Field museum October 28, and to the seventh annual conference of the Parent-Teacher Section of the Lake Shore Division of the Illinois State Teachers association held in the Orrington hotel roof garden on April 25.

Reports of the first and last named of these conferences will be given next Friday afternoon in the Public library in the school, at the annual meeting of the Deerfield P. T. A. on May 13. Mrs. J. A. Reichelt, Jr., the delegate to Quincy, will tell of the Character Making Conference, the subject of which was "Better Trained Parent-Teacher," and Mrs. H. G. Cazal, the president of the P. T. A., will report the findings of the Psycho-Analysis Clinic of Northwestern university as reported at the P. T. A. conference in Evanston.

#### NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity; County Seat Doings

Construction on the proposed \$3,000,000 plant of the Northern Coke and Chemical company on the Waukegan north flats will be started this week, it was announced last week.

Work of removing the tower which has surmounted the Waukegan Immaculate Conception church for its more than 78 years of existence was started by workmen last week. Indications were that the tower would be removed in a few days.

Harry Odhner 47, leading tailor of Hubbard Woods, was instantly killed last week when his car, which had stalled on the Woodland avenue crossing at Glencoe, was struck by the crack suburban train on the North Western Line.

Irving Smith, Libertyville farm hand who has been in the county jail for the past three months, last week was sentenced to serve from one to fourteen years in the state penitentiary at Joliet on a charge of forgery.

According to advices received in Waukegan last week-end the federal government, through their agents at Milwaukee, have planned to lay out a beacon lighted airway for aviators traveling between Chicago and Milwaukee. One of the beacon lights is to be located at North Chicago and one near the Wisconsin state line on the Illinois side. The lights will be kept burning at night to give the fliers a guide by which to travel to and from Milwaukee.

Control for rehabilitating the Grant and Rothschild clothing plant at North Chicago which was destroyed by fire several weeks ago, has been let, it is reported, and work will start immediately on the building.
