ANNA CASE TO SING AT MUSIC FESTIVAL

NOTED SOPRANO ON BILL

Will Appear on Program With Lawrence Tibbett, Well Known Baritone

Miss Anna Case, the noted concert soprano who is to sing at the North Shore Music Festival as one of the soloists, has just completed arrangements regarding the selections which she is to present. Miss Case will be one of the soloists at the evening concert May 28, the last one of the festival series, when she will appear on the same program with Lawrence Tibbett, who is an accepted favorite with North Shore audiences.

It is announced that Miss Case will sing a recitative and aria from "The Marriage of Figaro," by Mozart and "Der Hirt auf dem Felsen," with clarinet obligato, by Franz Schubert. It is expected that she also will be heard in a duet with Lawrence Tibbett, definite announcement regarding this selection is to be made later. These numbers will give ample opportunity to hear Miss Case to the best advantage. She will appear in place of Mary Lewis, whose engagement has been cancelled.

Three Conductors

Mr. Tibbett, whose baritone voice and dramatic abilities have won him favor, will also sing solo numbers on the same program. The unusual quality of the offerings that are to be made at this concert is evident from the fact that there will be three conductors—Messrs. Stock, Oldberg and Lutkin, each of whom will direct special selections. Prof. Oldberg will conduct while the orchestra plays a selection from his own third symphony and Mr. Stock will wield the baton during the purely orchestral selections.

The orchestral numbers will include "Le Carnaval Ro Main," by Berlioz and the splendid suite from "The Fire Bird," by Stravinsky, in addition to the movement from the symphony by Prof. Oldberg.

The festival chorus, 600 voices strong, will give a splendid climax to the concert by singing a scene and the Finale from the "Mount of Olives," Beethoven's only cantata. This selection concludes with the "Hallelujah" chorus.

Interesting and Varied

It will be seen that this program is interesting and varied, as well as being exceptionally high class. The Stravinsky composition caused quite a flurry when it first appeared because of its unusual features. The feeling against it that was shown for a time has now disappeared, so that it has become one of the most popular of orchestral selections. Taken as a whole, this concert is certain to bring the series to an enthusiastic close.

NINETY-EIGHT PAIRS ARE SEEKING DIVORCE

Ninety-eight couples, all suffering from marital woes, are listed on the special May docket for the circuit court. Most of them are asking for a complete separation in the way of a divorce, others are asking an annulment while still others wish for separate maintenance.

Of the 98 suits pending 91 are for straight divorces, five for separate maintenance and three for annulment.

The possibility of a good number of these cases being heard this term is good. Judge Edward Shurtleff and Judge C. C. Edwards are both on the bench doing what they can to clear up the congested docket.

Naturally there are about 15 old cases that will never come to trial in that the couples since asking for a divorce, had settled their differences and gone back living together.

During the last few weeks there were more than 25 new cases filed but the number is not in excess of those filed last year at this time.

Most of the divorce bills are from Waukegan and North Chicago the two populous centers of the county.

DENY SUIT PLANNED IN COUNTY ZONE CASE

Denial was made last week by a number of subdividers in the lake region that mandamus suits would be started to compel the county recorder to record subdivisions, although not in accordance with present plat regulations.

Some of the subdividers were disappointed and incensed because the board of supervisors at its meeting last Friday did not act on proposed amendments to the plat regulations. Judge Martin C. Decker, who is representing a number of subdividers in the lake district that no court action will be started until after the matters have been acted upon by the plat committee of the county board.

The board was prepared to act on proposed amendments last week, but the committee in charge did not have the matter quite ready when the board adjourned, so action was deferred until the June meeting. There is no question but what the board will favor the changes, it is said.

SEVERAL HIGHWAY CONTRACTS ARE LET

Roads to Be Improved in Lake County This Summer Are Designated

The contracts for improving several roads in Lake county were awarded at the court house in Waukegan last Thursday.

The road between Round Lake and Long Lake, a distance of 1.5127 miles, was awarded to McGugen & Vanderhayden, their bid being \$13,485. The estimate of the engineers was \$15,238. This is for the grading and installing of culverts only.

On the Ivanhoe-Grayslake road, a distance of 3.84 miles, in the towns of Avon and Fremont, for paving the roadway with 18 feet of concrete, Frank Feutz offers to do the job for \$88,623.35. The estimate is \$90,880.

What is known as the Millburn road in the towns of Warren, Lake Villa, Newport and Antioch the total length to be improved 5.614 miles, S. J. Groves & San, submitted a bid of \$121,335.77 for paving the road with concrete to a width of 18 feet. Darrow & Barron's bid was \$127,504. The estimate is \$131,146. The commission has taken this matter under advisement to determine which contractor can be on the job in time to start work at once.

The Iowa Bridge Co. bid \$5,560.77 for building a bridge of 40 foot span in Grand township, near Round Lake. The estimate on this job is \$6,128.

SWIFT OFFERS BILL FOR AID OF FARMERS

Would Indemnify Them for Losses Due to Slaughter of Cattle in Test

Scores of farmers in Lake county will profit to the value of thousands of dollars if a bill introduced in the state senate last week by State Senator Rodney B. Swift of Lake Forest becomes a law. The bill calls for the appropriation of \$100,000 to indemnify owners of cattle slaughtered for tuberculosis.

Tuberculin testing within the last year has resulted in the killing of hundreds of heads of cattle in Lake county. This weeding out of cattle that reacted to the test has been a most expensive one to local farmers and they are looking forward with much anticipation to favorable consideration by the senate and house of Senator Swift's measure.

Farmers of Lake county are not the only ones who have suffered a result of the wholesale slaughter of tubercular cattle. In several other counties the loss has been nearly as heavy as in this county. Farmers in the other counties also would be partially reimbursed for their cattle if the bill becomes a law.

To just what extent the proposed appropriation would repay the farmers has not yet been announced.

CARDINAL DEDICATES HUBBARD WOODS CHURCH

His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein officiated at the dedication services recently of the new Sacred Heart church in Hubbard Woods. This beautiful building, with its rectory, has been built at a cost of over \$300,000, during the past two years. The old church is now used as a meeting hall. The new buildings are of Bedford stone. They are located on a large site on North avenue and are set back among beautiful trees.

Cardinal Mundelein was accompanied at the services by twenty-one priests and the Right Rev. Bernard Menges. The abbot of St. Bernard's, A. I., who is a cousin of the Rev. Father Haarth of the Sacred Heart church, celebrated the solemn pontifical High Mass. Father M. Klasek was deacon, and Father J. Neumann of Wilmette was sub-deacon. Father Morrison of Chicago was master of ceremonies. The choir sang the impressive Jubilee mass, by Gruber. It was accompanied by a nine-piece orchestra from the Chicago Civic Opera company.

URGE COUNTY POLICE WOMAN BE APPOINTED

REASONS ARE OFFERED

County Board Receives Letter From Women's Organizations Asking Therefor; What Reasons Are

Nine reasons why a county policeman is needed in Lake county are stated in a communication to the board of supervisors, signed by the Lake County League of Women Voters, Y. W. C. A., and the Waukegan Woman's club. The reasons given, follow:

1. Supervision of the roadhouses including dressing rooms.
2. Visit resorts and dances.
3. To be constantly on the alert for protection of young girls and prevention of crime.
4. To perform detective work on special cases involving women and children.
5. Locating missing children.
6. To stop indecent movies and prevent indecent posters being put up.
7. To visit unlighted places frequented by young people at night.
8. To attend court.
9. To supervise jail conditions.

A letter from Miss Elizabeth L. Crandall, Juvenile Protective officer in Cook county accompanied the communication of the organizations. She told the board of problems which a policewoman can take care of and of the need of a policewoman in Lake county for the protection of the young people.

This matter was referred to the finance committee at the last meeting, so the communications were also referred to this committee and a report will be made to the board at the June meeting.

DISCUSS NEW CHURCH PLANS AT WINNETKA

On Wednesday evening, May 25, Winnetka will learn whether or not it is to have a new Winnetka Congregational church structure in the near future. A big meeting of the congregation has been called for that date, to be held in Matz hall to decide whether or not the financial committee shall be instructed to proceed with a building subscription campaign in the fall.

This meeting is to be the culmination of six years of work by committees which have studied the problem of a new church, which have examined sites, conferred with architects, examined church structures in every part of the country, and had sketches of a proposed new church drawn.

HOLD TWO BANDITS FOR ANTIOCH THEFT

Ex-Convicts Captured Last Week at Lake Forest; Bonds Are \$10,000 Each

Two ex-convicts, Barney Foster and Edward White, caught Thursday morning by Lake Forest police shortly after they had looted the Williams brothers store at Antioch, were bound to the grand jury in bonds of \$10,000 each by Police Magistrate Edwin Burgess, Lake Forest.

They were held by Sergt. Jack Dunn, Lake Forest, for another day until Chicago police could question them to find the whereabouts of a man named Hartman, who is charged with committing a number of burglaries in Chicago and suburbs with White who was once imprisoned in the Oklahoma state penitentiary for burglary. Dunn and Patrolman Joseph Dunakin made the arrest, stopping the pair who carried four loaded guns, because they looked suspicious.

White, it was found at the bureau of identification in Chicago, took part in a number of burglaries in Chicago and one at Morris, Ill., in which 250 suits of clothing were stolen. His pal in these crimes, Dunn said was a man named Hartman.

FIRE DESTROYS HOUSE ON HAWTHORN FARM

Gardener's Cottage on Insull Estate Near Libertyville Burned Last Week

Fire, origin unknown, starting on the roof of the gardener's cottage on the Hawthorn farm, owned by Samuel Insull, near Libertyville at 10 o'clock last week resulted in the destruction of the residence, valued at more than \$8,000.

The Mundelein fire department made a valiant fight to save the structure, but was handicapped by the lack of a sufficient supply of water. With its new pumper throwing streams into the fire which seemed to be in a fair way to be controlled, the well from which water was being drawn became dry and it was then necessary to pipe water to the well from a large tank nearby. This resulted in a costly delay.

The dwelling, which was two stories in height, had eight rooms and was built of frame covered with stucco and was occupied by E. C. Timms, head gardener.

DR. KARL BECK, COUNTY PHYSICIAN, ASSISTANT

Dr. Karl Beck, newly elected county physician and superintendent of the Lake County General hospital, has announced the reappointment of Mrs. Ruth Banks as assistant superintendent of the hospital. Dr. Beck said there will be no changes made in the hospital staff of nurses and other attendants.

MAID MURDERED IN LAKE FOREST HOME

Wilma Miller, 25, maid in the residence on the Thorne Donnelly estate at Lake Forest, was found lying in the hall of the house, Saturday evening, with her skull crushed in apparently by a blunt instrument. She had been alone in the house, as the family have been absent for months on a European tour, but were expected home this week.

A man named Odo Poeschel, 25, employed for about a month as chauffeur for Mrs. Abby Farwell, another wealthy Lake Forest resident, was arrested by the police. He was identified as the man seen running from the Donnelly house Saturday evening by Joe Tarrison, the Donnellys' colored furnace man and by Mrs. Petersen, housekeeper for a neighboring family. Poeschel, it was reported, had been courting the Miller girl. He admitted knowing her but denied committing the crime or having been at the house. He was taken to the county jail and a warrant charging murder was issued.

NEW TRIAL GRANTED IN MAWMAN CASE

Judge C. C. Edwards last week allowed Supervisor Edward Mawman, Lake Bluff, a new trial in the case in which Eli Inman, Chicago, had sued for \$2500 brokerage fees and was allowed \$1,200 by a jury in the circuit court. Attorney George W. Field represented Inman and Attorney Max Przyborski was counsel for Mawman. Mawman contended that Inman had not been asked to handle his \$50,000 land deal at Lake Bluff and that he was not a licensed broker.

Second Liberty Loan Bonds have been called for redemption on November 15, 1927, and will cease to bear interest on that date.

The bonds should be presented on or prior to November 15, 1927, to a Federal reserve bank or branch thereof. Your own bank or trust company will no doubt be willing to assist you in effecting the redemption.

Important—Prior to November 15, 1927, the Secretary of the Treasury may extend to holders of Second Liberty Loan bonds the privilege of exchanging their bonds for other securities of the United States government.

In order that you may be advised of the terms of the exchange offering, if announced, you should keep in touch with your bank or trust company.
