 turn to the putting machine, which accurately records the length of your put from one to ninety feet.
 The driving machine is of wood construction; about 7 by 8 feet in measurement, over the front of which is faced with a heavy canvass, on which there is marked a three foot target; fairways are noted, also rough. The space about 6 inches deep back of the canvas is air inflated by an electric motor pump. The greater volume of air being in the space of target and fairway, lessening gradually in volume towards the sides of the machine, so that a ball driven inside the target or on the fairway will displace a greater volume of air, than a like ball driven to the side,—therefore in the first instance will register a greater distance than a ball driven off to the side. The motor keeps the volume of air in the chamber uniform.
 You can play any course on this machine, using any club score-card. Also, Mr. Decker has very cleverly laid out on a board 3 ft. x 4 ft. a sporty 9-hole course, noting a creek running through it; making it necessary to play four water holes.

Mr. Decker is a member of the Bob O'Link Golf club, and incidentally was one of the worst putters at Bob O'Link, and for that reason, built a machine for practice putting. He was so pleased with results of improvements on his putting, that he started to work on a driving machine, which after many months of labor and experiments, he developed the Indoor Golf machine as it now is.
 The machine was displayed and operated at the Golf Show recently held at the Sherman Hotel, Chicago; much interest was shown, a number of amateurs and professionals tried their skill, and all confessed that they got a real kick playing a game of golf on this machine.
 You play the game the same as you would out doors; it is not a toy game; you can see by the scores you make how your game is progressing. A few minutes now and then playing or putting over this Indoor Golf machine will materially improve your game.
 Mr. Decker has set up a machine at his office 15 South St. Johns avenue, and heartily invites the public to come in and see the machine and give it a try out.

New Scout Troop at Northbrook
 Northbrook's first scout troop, troop No. 61, of the North Shore area, was formed last Friday night. Four patrols were started and plans for the progress of the next few weeks were worked out. The troop will meet every Friday night, largely in outdoor sessions, under the leadership of Scoutmaster William W. Clore, and his brother, James Clore, assistant scoutmaster.

Highland Park Court of Award
 The June court of award for troops of the Highland Park vicinity will be held on the beach, according to an announcement from the court of honor committee, of which Dr. Geo. B. Lake is chairman. In case of bad weather the court will be held inside as usual, but the plan is for an outdoor presentation of awards at which the parents are invited. It is even hinted that marshmallows may be present for an "after-the-court" treat. The court of award will be preceded in the afternoon by the customary board of review.

Fun Rally
 Everybody invited to scout fun rally at "Cabin in the Woods." When the starters signal sounds next Saturday afternoon and six hundred scouts start on the ten-minute "wool hunt" even the squirrels will scratch their heads and listen, according to the scouts who are taking part in the heralded event. Saturday morning a group of scout leaders will distribute some dozen baskets of wool at various places around the "Cabin in the Woods."

Troops from all the north shore towns will take part in competing in some eight different events. The purpose of the rally is not so much to

see which troop is fastest or best prepared to win, as to bring all the troops together, the weak and the strong alike, in a big afternoon of fun.

Variety in Events

A contest for speed in boiling water, in signalling, a bugling contest, fire building contest, scouts' pace and knot tying teamwork—such is the list of events. Points will also be awarded on the basis of the troop with the best attendance and the most representative entries in all events.

Applications for Camp

One more month until some 90 scouts of the north shore troops will sail for Owasippe, Mich., to spend a two-week camping period at Camp Cheaugau, one of the outstanding scout camps of the middle west. Troops from Glencoe and Lake Bluff, and occasional patrols and individual scouts from most of the north shore towns, have camped at Owasippe in years past. This year the "first" period, June 27 to July 9, will be made up largely of scouts of the north shore troops.

Junior Officer Conference

Scouts from nearly 20 troops, junior officers who are helping in the management of their respective troops, gathered at the Gorton school, Lake Forest, last Saturday morning for the fourth monthly junior officers' conference. Problems that junior officers face in the administration of patrol and troop, and opportunities of coming events were discussed.

It was decided to hold the final conference of the spring at the "Cabin in the Woods" on Saturday, June 11. The conference will be the final one until the big rally of junior officers to be held early in September.
