CORONER'S JURY HOLDS PUESCHELL

Recommend Taking Alleged Lake Forest Murderer Before Grand Jury

With but short deliberation a coroner's jury at Lake Forest last week recommended that Odo Puschell, 25, chauffeur for the Montgomery Ferrys be held to the grand jury for the murder of Wilma Miller, 25, maid in the home of the Thorne Donnelleys, May 7.

States Attorney Smith called but four witnesses, including Joseph Hirston, negro, who said he saw Puschell run from the Donnelley home at the time he found the maid, Dr. W. P. McCullough, who testified as to the extent of the wounds, and Mr. Donnelley who stated that the maid had been employed in his household.

The jury attributed the cause of the death to a skull fracture made with a heavy weapon with murderous intent. They concluded by recommending that Puschell be held to the grand jury.

With Col. Smith at the inquest was his assistant, S. H. Block.

Puschell was not taken to Lake Forest. He was left in the county jail where he has been since Saturday.

Positive identification of Odo Puschell, as the man who talked to Miss Miller in the Thorne Donnelley home for 30 minutes or more prior to the murder, was made last week by Miss Fannie Warris, friend of the dead girl.

The identification, according to States Attorney Smith, was made in his office. She further identified the green stoned ring found in the chauffeur's pocket as one she had often seen on Miss Miller's finger, he reports. Puschell denies the ring belonged to the girl.

POLLUTION OF WATER INCREASING MENACE

SAY IZAAK WALTON GROUP

Investigation by Its Committee Shows That Cleansing of Streams of Filth Must Be Urged

A recent survey by the pollution department of the Izaak Walton League of America has brought forth some startling facts, according to Dr. William D. Hatfield, director of the bureau at national headquarters of the league here.

"60,000,000 people in the United States are served by sewer systems," Dr. Hatfield declared, discussing his findings, "and of this huge number only 18,500,000 have some form of sewage treatment. And half of that is little better than useless. It is no wonder that a national cry has arisen against this menace to health. The Walton league, through its 3,000 league chapters, has inaugurated a nation-wide anti-pollution campaign that is destined to include every small lake and stream of the country. All chapter secretaries are aiding national headquarters through their filling out of blanks sent them pertaining to pollution conditions in the waters adjacent to their chapters. These are being received by us and filed and marked on a large map. In this manner we can accurately check progress, both that of pollution and of the league's anti-pollution drive."

Hold Symposium A pollution symposium held at the fifth annual national convention of the Walton league early in April was attended by many nationally famous authorities on sewage and industrial waste questions. Dr. Henry Baldwin Ward, of the University of Illinois faculty and a member of the executive committee of the Izaak Walton league, told those present that no civilized nation in the world has so much untreated waste as has the United States, and as a result public health was endangered to an alarming degree. Much of the natural resources of the country also are in danger of being destroyed. In some states, Dr. Ward said, rivers and lakes are almost beyond redemption, so badly are the waters tainted.

Already many bodies of water have been cleaned of filth and pollution by Izaak Walton league chapters, and efforts are being made to hasten the ultimate stoppage of the use of fresh water as a disposal place for all sorts of wastes. Various industries and state health officials are co-operating with the league in its meritorious fight to abate the pollution evil.
