Memorial Day Feature; Many at Play Sunday; Press Gives Special Cup

At Sunset Golf club more than 200 registered for play last Sunday and weather conditions did not dampen their spirits, all greatly enjoying the excellent course. absence of other legal opinion on this subject, I must accept this decision as my guide in concluding that it is illegal for this city to pay such fees.

The ordinance further provides for the payment of \$1,200 per year to a City Attorney, which office they created. This, I feel, is unnecessary and expensive to the people of Highland Park, as one man can easily perform all legal duties for the city. I base this statement on the fact that there are few cities of this size, having more than one attorney.

The salary of the City Treasurer is being increased thirty-three percent although my suggestion of a very capable man, willing to do the work at the old salary, was ignored.

The salary of the City Collector was increased from \$3,000 to \$3,400 per year, although this office could undoubtedly be filled at an expense not exceeding \$2,400 per year.

The total increases in salaries for present employees amount to over \$5,700. New employees taken on, add \$11,040 more, making total salary increases of over \$16,700 annually.

Commissioner Reay then introduced the appointment of Samuel S. Holmes as Corporation Counsel and this was carried over the dissenting votes of Mr. Gourley and myself.

An ordinance creating the office of City Attorney and prescribing the duties of such office was also introduced by Commissioner Reay. This ordinance provides that the City Attorney shall be under the direction and supervision of the Corporation Counsel and that the City Attorney, among other things, shall be entrusted with the duty of conducting prosecutions under the Zoning and Building Ordinances. In this connection, he is given the right to compromise with any violator of these ordinances when, in his judgment, the public interest does not require that such action upon such terms as, to him, may seem equitable.

Messrs. Brown, Reay and Zimmer have therefore voted to place in the hands of one man, extreme discretionary powers which might prove to be very dangerous.

The City Attorney, by this ordinance, has the power to render the Zoning and other ordinances of non effect, when, in his judgment, the public interest does not require any action to be prosecuted. It also permits him, in effect, to modify these and other ordinances as he sees fit, in making such compromises.

In order to rush this ordinance into effect, an emergency clause was inserted. I believe no emergency exists and this entire matter should have been given more careful consideration.

In my opinion, this is one of the most vicious ordinances ever forced on the people of Highland Park.

Commissioners Brown, Reay and Zimmer have appointed their subordinates. I feel I should have the same privilege in order to produce the best results in my department. My subordinates, however, have been forced upon me.

I am giving these facts to the people that they may fully appreciate the situation as it exists.
