SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE NO. 105

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highwood, Lake County, Illinois, have ordered the construction of a four (4) inch internal diameter cast iron water main supply pipe, together with the necessary connections, special castings, valve and fire hydrant in and along Western Avenue and Euclid Avenue from and connecting with the north end of the existing main in Western Avenue, thence north along said Western Avenue on a line twelve (12) feet west of the east line thereof to a point twenty-two (22) feet south of the north line of said Euclid Avenue, thence east along Euclid Avenue on a line twenty-two (22) feet south of the north line thereof, four hundred ninety (490) feet, more or less, to a point opposite the west line of the property owned by the Chicago and North Western Railway lying south of Euclid Avenue in the City of Highwood, County of Lake, State of Illinois. The ordinance for the

same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City, and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment for the cost of said improvement according to benefits, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 11th day of June, A.D., 1927, at 10 o'clock A.M., or as soon thereafter as the business of the Court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in five (5) installments, with interest at the rate of six per centum, pursuant to law, from and after the date of rate of six per centum, pursuant to issue of first voucher.
