It will serve to bring before Ravinia patrons nearly all of the artists Mr. Eckstein has engaged for the new season, and will present them in roles in which they have won wide-spread favor in many of the world's opera houses. The operas themselves are prime favorites with all Ravinia patrons. They are broadly representative of the best of all operatic literature, including five of the best known of the Italian operas, and two which may be considered as classics of the French school, They likewise serve to emphasize the broad range of human emotions, which is so ideally reflected in opera. Commissioner Brown moved that the corporation counsel draft an ordinance making it possible to grant permits for installing gasoline pumps in parkways up to October 1, 1927, under same requirements as provided by the present ordinance.

The matter of repairs on Cedar avenue, between Linden and Lincoln, was referred to Commissioner Brown and the engineers for report.

Commissioner Gourley moved in quiries be instructed to prepare estimate of cost of sidewalk on north side of County Line road west of new highway bridge.
