

**TO OPEN NORTHFIELD SUBURB ON JUNE 18**

**Celebration to Mark Inauguration of New Nixon Subdivision; Details**

Northfield, the first suburb to be established on the North Shore in a generation, will be given a royal welcome by the other communities of which it is to be a neighbor. Plans just announced provide for an all-day celebration on Saturday, June 18, which will betit the importance of this civic event.

Mayor Lewis of Highland Park has been invited as a guest of honor on Saturday, June 18, when the ceremonies ushering Northfield into existence will be celebrated. He has been asked to attend as the guest of John Happ, president of the village board, and other trustees of Northfield.

The mayors and village board presidents of every suburb have been invited. They include the chief executives of Waukegan, Highland Park, Lake Forest, Highland Park, Glencoe, Winnetka, Kenilworth, Hubbard Woods, Wilmette, Evanston, Glenview, Deerfield, Niles Center, Libertyville and Mundelein.

Leaders in the financial and industrial worlds also will be the guests of the Northfield board of trustees. With the mayors of the towns they will figuratively shake the new municipal baby by the hand and give their wishes for success to the plans for developing a super-suburb.

George F. Nixon & company, founders and developers of the new town, are formulating plans for the celebration Saturday. Co-operating with them, to make it a day that will be long remembered, is the North Shore Line.

Northfield lies right at the station on the Skokie Valley extension of the North Shore Line and special trains from the loop will whisk thousands of guests of the Nixon company over the elevated lines and out to the celebration. The schedule of the special trains will be announced later.

Dedication of the site of the village hall will be one of the features of Saturday's celebration.

**LARGE ENROLLMENT FOR SUMMER SCHOOL**

**Hundred and Forty-Five Listed for Vacation Classes at Deerfield High**

One hundred forty-five students will attend summer school at Deerfield-Shields high school according to the number who have registered in the school office.

The summer term will open on Monday, June 20, the first Monday after commencement.

This year, as in the past, a student will be allowed to take one new subject, or two repeats. The school day is from eight until twelve. The courses offered will be in American history, English, Latin, French, Spanish, geometry, algebra, arithmetic, Ancient history, European history, economics, mechanical drawing, typewriting, and stenography. There will be no courses in shop or science, as stated in the Shoreline last week.

The members of the faculty who will teach in summer school are Mr. Slocum, Mr. Pertz, Mr. Heaton, Miss Griswold, Miss Bredin, Constance Williams, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Wright, and Mr. Crosby. Coach Peel will have charge of the swimming tank during the summer months.

tickets will be mailed or held, as may be desired. If reservations are made on the day of the performance for which they are desired, the tickets must be paid for at the box office before five o'clock in the afternoon.

**Ordering in Advance**

For the benefit of those who desire to order tickets in advance, and who find it more convenient to have them held until called for, an arrangement which has been entirely satisfactory in the past will be in vogue again this year. Under this plan those desiring such accommodation will make a deposit of \$20 for which a receipt will be given. Seats ordered in advance will then be held until called for at the box office, but must be paid for

at that time to leave the total amount of the deposit intact.

There can be no returns, cancellations or exchanges, nor may depositors transfer their rights for the use of others, under this plan. When tickets so ordered are not called for, they will be charged to the depositor. These deposits may be made after June 18 at the Ravinia box office, or may be made now by mail addressed to the Ravinia company, 36 South State street, Chicago. The deposits will be returned at the end of the season in September.

Then comes the question of prices.

**Admission Prices**  
The general admission at the gate is one dollar, but coupon books are sold at eighteen dollars for twenty coupons. Reserved seats for the opening night of the season are three and four dollars. On all other opera nights the reserved seats sell at \$1.50, \$1.75, \$2.25, \$2.75 and \$3.00. On Monday, concert nights, there is no charge for reserved seats, the one dollar general admission at the gate covering everything.

In addition to the splendid transportation facilities it enjoys, Ravinia has always been a paradise for motorists, the roads from every direction stretching through the most beautiful portions of the north shore.
