

### STATE FAIR SCHOOL FOR ILLINOIS BOYS

During the Illinois State Fair, Aug. 20 to 28, three hundred and twenty-two boys from the state at large will have the privilege of attending the Boys' State Fair school. This is one of the big educational features of the fair which annually attracts a great deal of attention over the state, and is of much benefit to the youths who have the privilege of attending.

**County Quota Fixed**  
Under the rules of the State Fair, Cook county is entitled to fifteen representatives. The fifteen counties of the state having a population of from 60,000 to 100,000 are each entitled to send five. Counties having a population of 40,000 to 60,000 may send four. The remaining 76 counties of the state are entitled to two representatives each, one from the country and one from town.

The county superintendent of schools, president of the Farmers' Institute and the chairman of the county board of supervisors, or a county commissioner compose the board to pass upon the applications from each county.

Forty additional attendants are provided, nine to be appointed by the members of the State Fair board and thirty-one by the Director, Department of Agriculture and the general manager of the fair. If any county in the state fails to fill its quota increases may be allowed some other county under the rules.

**High Qualifications Necessary**  
Under the regulations high qualifications are required for appointment. Only boys of excellent character and ability will be selected. The examining boards are instructed to test the ability of each applicant, directing their attention to some object and asking a careful report be made of their observations. Each applicant will also be asked to listen to some lecture or talk and to reproduce the main points discussed, writing a report on what they have seen or heard.

### LITERARY MENTOR'S LIST OF BEST BOOKS

William Lyon Phelps of Yale Picks Twelve; Works of Famous Writers

William Lyons Phelps, Yale's literary mentor, takes issue in the June Scribner's magazine with Arnold Bennett's choice of the 12 greatest novels. The English author selected four novels by Dostoevski, three by Tolstoi, four by Turgenev, and one by Gogol.

"In literary criticism," says Dr. Phelps, in his monthly department, "As I Like It." "Mr. Bennett's enthusiasm sometimes runs away with his judgment, and he plunges headlong into superlatives. He is less sober and self-restrained in dealing with books than in dealing with life.

"I share Mr. Bennett's admiration for the mighty Russians, but not to this exclusive limit. Even if I were making up a list of the 12 best Russian novels it would not be identical with Mr. Bennett's." Dr. Phelps then gives a list of fifteen, arranged in approximate chronological order. It will be observed that he assigns one book to each of the first three authors named by Mr. Bennett:

- Swift "Gulliver's Travels"
- Richardson "Clarissa"
- Fielding "Tom Jones"
- Balzac "Eugenie Grandet"
- Dumas
- "The Three Musketeers," and sequels
- Dickens "David Copperfield"
- Hawthorne "The Scarlet Letter"
- Thackeray "Henry Esmond"
- Flaubert "Madame Bovary"
- Turgenev "Fathers and Children"
- Hugo "Les Miserables"
- Tolstoi "Anna Karenina"
- Dostoevski
- "The Brothers of Karamazov"
- Twain "Huckleberry Finn"

### MOTORISTS WARNED OF FOREST FIRE RULES

One of These Prohibits Smoking Except at Camps and Habitations

Motorists planning trips into the national forest reserve areas are warned by the Chicago Motor Club that strict forest fire prevention regulations are being enforced.

One of the most important of these measures, made effective by national forests except as improved camps and places of habitation. In the Eldorado, Stanislaus, Sierra, Sequoia, Inyo and Mono forests, the "no smoking" order will apply only to areas around 7,500 feet or less in elevation and not to the high Sierra region. This regulation will remain in effect until the fall rains eliminate the fire hazard.

Motorists planning camping trips on any of the national forest areas, under another regulation just announced, must carry a shovel and an axe for fire-fighting purposes. Statistics show that many of the damaging fires reported in recent years might have been extinguished if the motorist or camper discovering the fire with tools for fire-fighting.

### WARNS THAT RADIO IS ON PERILOUS GROUND

Complicated Character of Situation Existing Likely to Be A Menace

Henry A. Bellows, of the Federal Radio Commission, warned the members of the National Electrical Manufacturer's association that the radio industry is on perilous ground. Nearly 80 per cent of the broadcast country are owned by individuals having no direct interest in any form of the electrical manufacturing or selling activity.

The Washington Post states that not more than ten stations in the country are able to show an even break between revenue gain from the sale of time and operating expense, and it adds that those who broadcast must secure and retain the good will of the public or their plans will be doomed as a failure.

In the reallocation of wave lengths only a small minority of stations were allotted rights in the preferred bands. The rest of the stations are dissatisfied, although most of them will go ahead jazzing up the air and prosecuting legal battles that may eventually result in a scientific design of broadcasting system.

### NOTABLE PLACE OF RIBBONS IN HISTORY

Chaucer Writes of Them and in Centuries Since They Have Been Used

Many of the decorations that bedecked the breast of young Lindbergh owed their beauty to their backgrounds of ribbons. It is not definitely known where, when, and by whom ribbons were first used. Presumably the earliest form of dress required some sort of a band for turgaments, or for keeping the hair in place.

Ribbons, as we know them, were referred to in the sixteenth century. Chaucer, the first poet to write in the English language, tells us that ribbons were used to portray the stories of dukes and kings, and like tapestries, were important mediums upon which to illustrate historical events.

Many textiles are used in making ribbons, and now the newest of all yarn—rayon—has established itself in the field. Ribbons are being made of rayon alone as well as with combinations of cotton and silk. An ex-

tra filament of yarn has been devised by the manufacturers of ribbons that is of exceptional softness, and this super-extra rayon ribbon is in high favor among manufacturers and dealers in ribbons. Rayon ribbon has become important in the creation of lingerie, and in the millinery field. In fact, rayon is almost as popular as the young man whose name appears in the opening paragraph of this article.


### DO NOT PAY TAXES IN CASH SAYS COLLECTOR

District Revenue Heads Points Out Dangers of Such Plan; Use Checks, Etc.

Mrs. Mabel G. Reinecke, Collector of Internal Revenue for the First District of Illinois, again requests taxpayers not to make payment of taxes in cash.

All payments should be in the form of money orders, bank drafts, or personal checks and should be made payable to the collector of Internal Revenue. Taxpayers are running the risk of being required to pay taxes a second time unless their remittances are in proper form; therefore, it will be to their advantage to bear in mind never to pay taxes in cash to anyone except at the cashier's window of Room 528, Federal Building, Chicago, Illinois, where they will receive cashier's receipt.

A cancelled check deposited by the Collector of Internal Revenue will always serve to identify the taxpayer's account to which the money was credited without difficulty.
