### NICARAGUA PEACE TRIUMPH FOR U.S.

POLICY VINDICATED

Peace Is Achieved and Pillage and Bloodshed Stopped by America's Good

"This is the result of the American intervention in Nicaragua. It is a f nance of constitutional government in the Central American republic, and throughout the hemisphere.

"Yet for weeks the ultra pacifists and critics of the American government generally have been filling the air with outery to the effect that the policy of the American government in Nicaragua was a policy of war, of imperialism, of attempted subversion of free government in Nicaragua. The present trouble, beginning with the overthrow by military force of a constitutional government elected fairly under the protection of American marines invited to the country to keep order, was inaugurated when the American marines were withdrawn. With the return of the American marines peace and order and constitutional government are restored.

#### Mexico's Interference

"Except for the interference of Mexico, unfriendly to the United States, there would have been no serious trouble in Nicaragua after the Nicaraguan congress constitutionally elected the present president. Yet in this military backing of the Sacasa revolutionaries, Mexico has gained the approval of American radicals and self-styled "liberals" always critical of the American government. Thru this Mexican intervention there has been heavy loss of life and property in Nicaragua. The most bitterly disappointed element in the United States now that the trouble in Nicaragua has come to a peaceful end, will be the sensational war-scare group, some members of which loudly proclaim themselves pacifists.

"If this element had been successful in frightening the American government from its firm position, they would not only have prolonged the war in Nicaragua, but they would have claimed vindication for their activities. Unfortunately for them, the government has stood firm, and its policies have reached their logical conclusion. There is a lesson in it which will not be lost upon the American people."

Road builders and bridge builders, contribution to peace, to the mainte- as well as those interested in navigation, have followed the engineering proposition with interest. The piers on the Chattahoochie river measured 14 by 26 feet at the base and they were 75 feet high.

A dynamite expert supervised the driving of what is known as "gopher holes" approximately half way through the base of each pier. This work had to be done by hand. Then a single hole was drilled in each corner and also into the two supporting centers, and the explosive charges were placed and primed with electric blasting caps.

When the shots were fired the big structure collapsed upon its base in such a way that practically no debris was thrown into the river channel.
