she was a devoted wife and mother. Nor did she consider her duties completed with the raising successfully of her fine family to manhood and womanhood, for when the wife of her son, Charles F. Grant, fell a victim in the influenza epidemic in 1918, his mother at once assumed the care of his three children and lavished upon them all the loving care which had marked the bringing up of her own.

There were ten children in the family of Mr. and Mrs. Grant, six sons and four daughters. Two boys died in infancy, and the children living are: William J. Grant, Highland Park; Mrs. Helen I. Mrs. Grant was a woman of noble character and splendid qualities which endeared her to all who knew her and during her many years of residence in Highland Park she was greatly beloved by a host of friends and throughout the community there is widespread sorrow that her long and useful life has reached its close. The family have the sincere sympathy of all in their bereavement.

THREE KILLED IN CROSSING ACCIDENT

Truck Struck by Train at Glenview Tuesday Morning; Did not See Train

Three men were killed and two others had miraculous escapes from death when a truck was struck and demolished on the Washington road crossing at Glenview near the south line of Lake county, at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, by a Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul train.

The dead are Alfred Gurban, Jr., 1547 Gunnison avenue, Chicago; S. T. Wilson, colored, Milwaukee, an unidentified man, about 45 years old.

The truck, occupied by four men, was being used in towing a second which had become disabled. Albert Gurban, Jr., was at the wheel of the first truck and the disabled truck was being steered by his father, Albert Gurban, Sr.

Unaware of the approach of the train which was southbound and traveling at a high rate of speed, the younger Gurban drove the truck into the track.
