Be it ordained by the Board of Commis- sioners of the Highland Park East Park District, County of Lake and State of Illinois:

Statistics gathered by the Woman's Home Com- panion show that while 8000 persons were killed last year in railroad ac- cidents, 20,000 were killed in their homes. Simple tumbles, which resulted last year in 6000 deaths and 50,000 in- juries, were caused by dark or wind- ing stairs, icy porches, polished floors, soapy bathtubs, things left lying about to trip one up, weak chairs, or piled-up boxes used instead of good stepladders. Scalding water and burns accounted for many more mis- happens. Gas and electricity improperly installed or handled did their share.

Statistics show that almost every- body in the United States now knows enough not to blow out the gas, but thousands have not yet learned that they should not touch an electric light when they are standing in a bathtub or when their other hand is on a faucet.
