GIFTS OF FLOWERS ARE APPRECIATED

BY AILING AND CRIPPLED

Work of Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild Is Worth While, According to Women Interested

Residents of the North Shore who are contributing cut flowers to the Chicago Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild for distribution to the crippled, sick and needy will be interested in an answer to the question, "Are the flowers appreciated?"

This Guild sees it that the underprivileged receive the flowers brought in by people who own gardens and that are left with attendants at the Guild's booth at the Chicago station of the Northwestern railroad near Gate 16. This booth is open daily from 7:30 to 10:30 in the morning except on Saturdays and Sundays.

Mrs. E. B. Jordan, chairman of the Guild committee says:

"Are the flowers appreciated? That question has been asked many times by outsiders, but to several of the earnest workers from the Chicago Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild, which opened its booth in the Chicago station of the Northwestern railroad, for the first time this year, June 1, the answer has come. Not only have the flowers gone regularly into some of the darkest corners of our County hospital to make the last few hours and days more bearable for the hopelessly incurable patients, and into wretchedly poor homes in the center of our big smoky city—where our wonderful visiting nurses report an unusual activity of the stork this past month, and where little children follow the 'distributor of flowers' in the street begging for 'just one flower' which they tenderly place in an old tin can or a milk bottle and set right in their front window—also they have gone to many little old crippled and bed-ridden grandmothers and forlorn grandfathers and cheered them by their bright colors and fragrance, and given to them a feeling of contact with the 'great out-of-doors'."

"One beautiful woman, who is giving of her best to the children of the street, told of a group of sixty boys to whom she had taught the game of checkers to help keep them off the street occasionally. She had worked up a spirit of competition among them and promised prizes to the four big winners. For prizes she chose four perfect roses, each with a lovely fern, and checker boards thinking the boards would be fairly devoured, but to her astonishment, the boys' pure joy was so great in their flower that even the coveted boards were forgotten! When sunshine can be brought into so many lives and even rough street boys can so prize 'just one flower' should not our luxuriously and comfortably housed suburbanites be thankful that women of insight have devoted so much of their time to the rise of so valuable an organization as the Chicago Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild, and share with others their flowers and fruits—and busy fathers consider it an honor to carry into Chicago a bundle of flowers even though wrapped in newspaper?"

Mrs. A. B. Affleck of Winnetka, wife of the president of the Universal Portland Cement company, christened the new \$1,000,000 freighter, B. F. Affleck, of the Pittsburgh Steamship company's fleet, which was launched Saturday at Toledo. The new ship is a 12,000-ton vessel, 604 feet long and sixty feet wide and is designed to carry ore, limestone, cement and coal between Lake Michigan and Lake Superior ports.

SWIFT'S ICE CREAM BILL KILLED IN HOUSE

LAKE COUNTY MEN REPAIR WHITE HOUSE

W. M. Edwards of Zion and His Helpers Expect to Finish About July 1

Few men ever have been accorded the right to roam at will through the rooms of the Whitehouse at Washington, associating the while with articles made sacred by the touch of Jefferson, Jackson and Madison, and by the tread of the immortal Lincoln, but thirty Lake County men who are working as plasterers in this cradle of American history take these honors as being all in a part of the day's work.

The group of men who have been employed since April 1st under the direction of Wm. M. Edwards of Zion as contractor on the re-lathing and re-plastering of the older portion of the building and the plastering of the additional story to be added to the structure for the most part are from Waukegan and Zion, while a few are from Kenosha. They will complete their task on July 1.

The work of the Zion contractor won praise from Col. U. S. Grant III, director of public buildings and parks at the national capital. Colonel Grant congratulated Mr. Edwards personally on the quality of workmanship.

NEW GOLF CLUB TO OPEN NEAR MUNDELEIN

Countryside Links to Be for Public Use, According to Recent Report

The Countryside Golf club will formally open a public course on Saturday, July 2nd.

This course, the newest in Lake County ready for play, is located two miles west of Mundelein on the extension of Hawley Street which leads directly to the club house and parking space. It is but a few minutes' drive from Libertyville.

In plans made sometime ago for the development of the Libertyville-Mundelein area—the Lake County Countryside—the increasing popularity of the game of golf was recognized.

It was decided, therefore, to lay out a course in an accessible location primarily for the enjoyment of the residents of this countryside. To identify this course as a part of the development of the Lake County Countryside, it was named Countryside Golf Club.

PLAN CLUBHOUSE FOR GLENCOE GOLF LINKS

COMMODIOUS STRUCTURE

Preliminary Work Has Been Begun and Prospect Is That Large Fund Will Be Raised

A beautiful commodious new clubhouse for Glencoe Municipal Golf course is one of the very near future possibilities for which improvement plans are now being drawn by John A. Scribbins, the well known architect, residing at 426 South avenue, Glencoe, according to the Glencoe News.

This announcement was made this week in connection with the re-organization of the Glencoe Municipal Playground committee whose jurisdiction also extends over that of the Municipal Golf course, famed far and near as one of the very best courses in the entire Chicago area.

The only thing that is lacking at this course, it is pointed out, is a clubhouse in keeping with the other high-grade facilities for making this the mecca of thousands of golf enthusiasts every season, to say nothing of the ever growing popularity of the course among local fans. A campaign of membership recruiting is now underway.

At the last meeting of the Glencoe village board the resignation of H. H. Sherer and former Trustee H. F. Keator as members of the Playground committee were received, whereupon Winfred D. Gerber, president of the board, filled the vacancies by the appointment of Alexander H. Marshall, village attorney and William Edwards, building commissioner. The other members of the committee are C. H. Munch, R. R. Hurford and F. J. Luetig. E. J. Knapp is secretary and J. A. Williams, superintendent.

At a meeting of the members of the committee last Sunday to perfect a re-organization, Mr. Edwards was elected president. His first action was to start preliminary work of obtaining the much needed new clubhouse. Tentative plans for the proposed improvement will be ready in a short time, it is said, and in the meantime other details in connection with the work in hand will be forwarded.

There are many important events scheduled for Glencoe Municipal Golf course this season, among the first of which will be an open tournament for the members, which has been arranged for July 20.

Seventy acres of the one hundred and one acres and on which ten of the eighteen holes of the course are located, belong to the Forest Preserve, the remaining thirty-one acres on which the other eight holes are located, are owned by the village.

LIBERTYVILLE DAY TO BE OBSERVED JULY 21

The annual Libertyville Day celebration, which was successfully staged for the first time last year, will be bigger and better than ever, according to announcement made this week by Commander Charles C. Hoskins of the Legion post of that town, which sponsoring this year's celebration.

The date has been set for Thursday, July 21 and the preliminary arrangements have been completed. A meeting was held at the town hall last week and the superintendency of the various activities which will mark the day were assigned to the members of the local post.

The celebration will be an all day affair starting with a big parade in the morning.

MARTIN GIVES BOND IN CONSPIRACY CASE

COUNTY FUNDS SCANDAL

Former Official of Defunct Waukegan Bank Back from Texas and Surrenders; Denys Charge

Harold F. Martin, formerly vice-president of the defunct Waukegan Security Savings bank, who according to County Treasurer Bracher influenced him to send \$100,000 of Lake county's funds to a Kansas bank, was surrendered last week by Attorney Jay J. McCarthy of Chicago. He is charged with conspiracy to embezzle along with County Treasurer Ira F. Pearsall, Caleb Busick and Clifford Nye.

Martin appeared before Justice of the Peace Hervey C. Coulson Wednesday, being represented by Atty. McCarthy and George W. Field, and furnished \$5,000 bonds, signed by Thomas F. McGreal and Ralph Arnold. His hearing was set but Attorney McCarthy indicated a continuance would be requested.

To Deny Charge
On advice of Attorney McCarthy, Martin refused to make any statements either to Assistant State's Attorney Sidney H. Block or to the press regarding the alleged embezzlement conspiracy. Attorney McCarthy said Martin can prove he was not involved in the conspiracy.

The fact that Martin was surrendered was a complete surprise, as it was understood he was in jail in Brownsville, Texas. In fact Sheriff Lawrence A. Doolittle was sent to Texas after Martin last Friday and is still there. Attorney McCarthy said that Martin came back here from Texas when he learned he was wanted in connection with the alleged \$100,000 embezzlement, arriving in Chicago Tuesday night.

Send Telegram
State's Attorney A. V. Smith last Friday sent a telegram to Sheriff Vann at Brownsville, Texas telling him he held a warrant for the arrest of Martin and explaining the charges and requesting him to take Martin into custody. Col. Smith said that later this same day he received a message from Sheriff Vann stating that he had located Martin. The prosecutor took this to mean that Martin was in jail so he sent Sheriff Doolittle to Texas that night after him.
