BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity; Doings at County Seat

James T. Mann former Waukegan alderman and prominently known resident of Waukegan and Lake county died last week at the home of his brother, George W. Mann with whom he has been residing about 12 years. The deceased was 68 years of age.

The coroners' jury after hearing evidence at the inquest into the death of Elmer Bell, aged 18 years, of Winthrop Harbor, who was fatally injured when his automobile collided with a truck, returned an open verdict last week.

Waukegan will have the state meeting of the Illinois Farmers' Institute next February, although the Academy theater demanded by the executive committee could not be had for this big event.

Mrs. Lucie Ayers, 93 years old, and for 84 years a resident of Lake County, died at the home of her son, John Ayres at Libertyville Wednesday after an illness of over three years. Death was due to old age.

Tentative plans for the establishment of a monster municipal airport on the lake front at Waukegan were laid in a meeting between Mayor L. J. Yager and Frank T. Fowler, secretary and manager of the Waukegan and North Chicago Chamber of Commerce last week.

James Morrow, alderman of a south side ward during the aldermanic form of government in Waukegan, extensive property owner of Waukegan and North Chicago and head of the automobile agency bearing his name, passed away in the hospital in Santa Monica, Cal., last week.

Mrs. Mary Pundt, 609 Glen Rock avenue, an old resident of the city died in the Lake County hospital last week after a long illness. She was 82 years of age and had a large circle of friends.

A Lake county man, Michael F. Cook of Lake Zurich, is acting as the plaintiff in an action in the United States district court in Chicago in which he is seeking to enjoin the Washington Park race track corporation from use of pari-mutuels in the motion of gambling at the Homewood track.

SUN VISORS WIDELY USED, SAYS EXPERT

HAGENBECK-WALLACE CIRCUS AT WAUKEGAN

Big Trained Animal Show to Appear There July 11; Many Features

Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus, proclaimed as the foremost trained wild animal show of the universe, will shortly be in our midst. Billers have finished their work through this territory and bright and highly colored posters tell of the coming of Hagenbeck-Wallace to Waukegan on July 11.

Many new innovations have been created by Hagenbeck-Wallace for the 1927 tour. "The Geisha" said to be the greatest musical spectacle ever produced will open the exhibition, while "Blazing Glory" a patriotic presentation will bring the program to a close. Several hundred characters appear in "The Geisha" and the wardrobe and costuming is said to be the most pretentious of any circus spectacle.

The Hagenbeck standard in traiped wild animal numbers has also been maintained and such noted subjugators as Clyde Beatty, Capt. Bernard and Bob MacPherson will send their jungle charges through sensational routines in the big steel arenas. In addition to the wild animal groups, there will be displays of domestic beasts. Several groups of Liberty Horses will appear in the rings, while the hippodrome track will be the scene of a Horse Show, second to none. Forty singing girls and forty prancing steeds appear in one display.

Other noted features include the Orrin Davenport Family of Equestrians, the Ward-Kimball Troupe of Flyers and Cheerful Gardner and the original Hagenbeck elephants. Plenty of clowns, to be exact fifty, will work all during the performances, which start promptly at 2 p. m. and 8 p. m. The big double menagerie includes specimens from all portions of the globe, including highly valuable giraffes.

HOLD ANNUAL MEETING OF RELIGIOUS COUNCIL

At the Presbyterian Church on Last Thursday; Re-Elect Officers; Appoint New Committees

The Highland Park Council of Religious Education held its annual meeting last Thursday night at the Presbyterian church and re-elected its officers for a nother year. T he officers are Mr. Frederick A. Watkins, president; Dr. Earl D. Fritch, vice-president; F. R. Cardwell, secretary; Mr. William E. Bletsch, treasurer.

A committee, known as the committee on the continuation of week-day work and headed by Rev. Karl A. Roth, was appointed. This committee will consider the advisability of again undertaking the work in religious instruction next fall as it has in previous years.

A forward step was taken by the council in that several other lines of work are to be undertaken. A committee, to be known as the education committee is to be headed by Dr. Earl D. Fritch was appointed. The Rev. Frank Fitt was appointed chairman of the library investigation committee.

Action was taken by the council urging the Sunday Schools to take part in the Highland Park day parade. Rev. W. F. Suhr was appointed chairman of a committee to devise a plan whereby the Council of Religious Education and Sunday schools of the churches represented in the council may be able to co-operate in this showing.
