Opponents of President Help to Make Him More Popular, Is Belief

It is the opponents rather than the proponents of the renomination of Calvin Coolidge who are making his renomination almost inevitable. Until recently, the normal American voter appreciating that Mr. Coolidge's present term had almost two years to run, was giving but scant attention to the mechanics of political activities. The general content and satisfaction with Coolidge must be credited with having contributed to this quietness. The proponents and admirers of the President were saying little-they were satisfied to allow the favoring winds to blow.

The opponents, however, have made his candidacy a talking issue. With etters, arguments and pronuncianentos, they sought first to attack his fitness for the office, and later his eligibility. The normal result has een to arouse the dormant confidence in Coolidge. Curiously enough, each anti-Coolidge move has been operated o prove the strength of the Presi-The anticipated revolt of the farming populations, it is agreed, is ardly an insurrection. UPHOLDS SEIZURE

BEYOND THE 12-MILE LIMIT

U.S. Supreme Tribunal Decides Coast Guard Had Right to Take Vessels; Other Decisions

The Supreme Court has upheld the coast guard in seizure as rumrunners of two vessels beyond the 12-mile limit but refused to pass upon the constitutionality of the British rum treaty, which had been attacked on the ground that it was working to the detriment of American shipping.

The seizure cases were instituted by Arthur Maul of Connecticut and James M. Lee of Massachusetts and involved, respectively, the vessel Underwriter, taken 34 miles off the coast and a small boat captured 24 miles off Boston Light, says the Christian Science Monitor.

Text of Decisions

In sustaining the seizure and forfeiture of the Underwriter, the court declared the coast guard had authority to take any vessel "liable to seizure by virtue of any law respecting the revenue," and asserted that this authority could be exercised outside as well as within the respective dis- deem it best for the public good.

It based its decision in the Lee case upon its findings in the Underwriter. and held that evidence obtained thru seizure of the small boat could be used in court.

The British rum treaty was attacked by the Neptune Association of Masters and Mates and others who contended it violated the prohibition amendment by permitting British vessels to bring intoxicating liquors for use on outward voyages or for transshipment in bond through the United States.

It was contended that this operated to the detriment of American vessels which were prohibited from having intoxicating liquor on board.

Other Cases Decided The Colorado anti-trust law was

declared void and unconstitutional by the court in an appeal brought by the district attorney of Denver in proceedings against the Frink and other dairy companies.

claim of the Creek Indian Nation for compensation from the federal government for more than 23,000,00 acres of land taken from them in 1814.

Railroad, industrial and other companies owning coal cars can be re stricted, the court held, in the use of them in getting fuel during times of car shortage by order of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

In a decision in the "assigned car" case, the court sustained orders of the commission requiring privately

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owned cars to be counted in the pro rata assignment of cars to soft coal mines during times of car shortage. The decision was rendered in ten cases appealed by the government.
