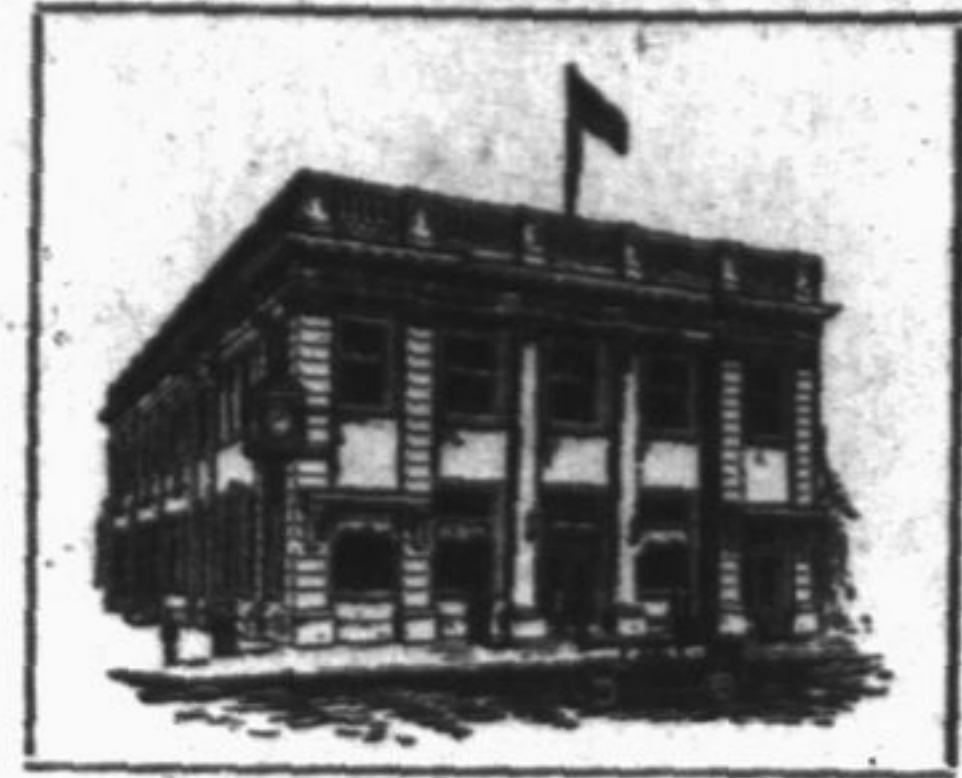
legality of advancing money from the general fund to the local improvement account for preliminary expenses in connection with six per cent costs was laid on the table until a later date.

Ordinances Passed
Commissioner Zimmer moved to amend an ordinance establishing and appointing a Highland Park zoning committee, prescribing its functions and designating the building commissioner as the officer to enforce all ordinances passed under terms of an act of the general assembly.

Commissioner Gourley moved to pass an ordinance to amend an ordinance prohibiting erection and maintenance of gasoline pumps in streets and parkways of the city of Highland Park, etc.

OPENS BRANCH STORE**

Charitable Organization is Now
Represented in This
City

The attractive new shop at 19 S. St. Johns avenue which has recently opened is a branch store of the Industrial Workshop of Chicago. This organization is not run for profit; it gives employment to over a hundred handicapped men and women, makes them self-supporting and prepares their for industry. They make exquisite underwear, by hand and by machine; their stock also includes men's aprons and uniforms, stunning negligees, baby covers, bathroom rugs, brooms and many small articles suitable for gifts.

The Highland Park branch has

been opened to keep the shops busy over the summer. It carries a complete line of samples and merchandise. The early American furniture which makes the store so distinctive is also for sale.

The store is being run by a group of volunteer workers, but it will operate on a strictly business basis. The Industrial Workshop hopes to make many new friends through this new branch.
