SHORTAGE IN FUNDS OF COUNTY CHARGED

tion and was held to the grand jury in \$5,000 bonds.

"At my request the sheriff's office at Brownsville, Texas, arrested Martin on Friday, and upon receipt of word I immediately sent Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle after him."

Out on Bonds
Bracher, Pearsall, Busick and Nye are all out in bonds. Joe Oltusky, professional bondsman, signed Nye's bond.

State's Attorney Smith charges that the funds were embezzled in 1922, during the first term of Bracher as county treasurer and that Ira Pearsall, who served as treasurer after Bracher's first term, covered up the alleged embezzlement.

Colonel Smith says that he has been informed the \$100,000 was removed from the Security Savings bank, where county funds were kept at the time and turned over to Harold Martin by Bracher to be sent by the former official of the Security bank to the bank in Kansas of which Nye was vice-president.

Nye according to Col. Smith, deposited only \$100 to Bracher's credit in the bank. Busick, also an official of the oil company along with Martin and Nye is alleged to have been a prime mover in the alleged conspiracy, to embezzle the county money.

Bond Protects County
Col. Smith says that the county does not stand to lose a cent through the defalcation, since County Treasurer Bracher is bonded for \$500,000 to the state and \$900,000 to the county. Both local banks and individuals are on the bonds.

Bracher Issues Statement
County Treasurer Bracher has

issued a statement in explanation of his part in the affair, the most important parts of which are as follows:

It was on the request of Harold Martin, then cashier of the Security Savings bank, that, in the spring of 1922, I sent \$100,000 to the Eureka, Kansas bank, Mr. Martin asking me to do this as a favor to him because he was a close friend of Mr. Nye of the Kansas institution. When the money was sent, they sent me a certificate of deposit showing \$100,000 deposited in their bank and naturally I presumed the money was there from then on—and, I still have in my possession, that certificate of deposit showing the money on deposit in Kansas.

It wasn't until I was getting ready to turn the funds over to my successor

Mr. Pearsall, that I discovered the Kansas bank had gotten into financial trouble and that the cashier, Mr. Nye, had embezzled the amount I had sent west and that instead of actually putting our \$100,000 into his bank, had entered a deposit of only one hundred dollars.

Neither Mr. Pearsall nor myself got one cent of this money and did not invest any of it in any oil lands, or anything else—I merely deposited it there the same as I did in other banks, only to wake up later and find that it actually had never been placed in the bank to my credit.

It has been my earnest desire and hope to take care of this shortage, even though it "broke" me; I have bent every energy toward that end and had hoped that it could be done

without the publicity that might follow, for, knowing in my heart that I had been the victim of another man's crookedness, nevertheless I realized that I personally was responsible for the county funds. However, now that it has become public, I want my friends to know the circumstances and to know that I stand ready and anxious right now to make up this amount, even though it will take every cent I have. It may take a little time but if given the chance, Lake County will sustain no loss whatever for my assets, when liquidated, will take care of the entire sum involved. I am making arrangements today to turn all of my property over to Mr. Staley (as trustee) of the People's bank in furtherance of my desire to square the entire matter.
