

BUILDING GAIN IN CITY DURING JUNE

GOOD RECORD MAINTAINED

Highland Park One of Few Suburbs Showing Increase in Improvements; List of Permits Issued

Records in the office of City Building Inspector, S. D. Morris, indicate that Highland Park during June maintained its gains in building improvements, which have marked the last several months while some suburban towns have dropped behind last year's mark in some recent months.

The total estimated value of building improvements here in June, according to permits issued is \$139,990, and the building covered include 11 dwellings, 15 private garages and 11 alterations. Total fees therefor were \$503.61. Three special permits were issued with total fees of \$7.50; 17 water taps, with fees of \$122, and 13 sewer taps with fees of \$90.

Substantial Gain
The total value of building permits for June, 1927, shows a substantial gain over the record of June, 1926, the total of which was \$119,380. The total estimated value for the period, May 1, 1927, to June 30, 1927, was \$449,805, as compared with a total of \$367,487 for the corresponding period in 1926.

GREAT LAKES WONDERS ATTRACT VACATIONISTS

Niagara Falls, Mackinac Island, George Bay Included In Fine Cruises

Three famous points of interest again attract thousands to the "Great Inland Seas," check-up on passenger lists indicate. Cooling lake breezes and thrill of trip on a majestic liner bring people from every state in the Union.

TRUCK DRIVER KILLED IN COLLISION FRIDAY

Jack Nelson, Ward Baking Co. Driver, Victim; Crash on Waukegan Road

Collision of two motor trucks on Waukegan road, one half mile south of Everett, at 7 o'clock Friday morning resulted in the death of Jack Nelson, aged 30 years, driver for the Ward Baking company and who had been making daily trips northward, and the arrest of the driver of the other truck on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Nelson, who suffered a fracture of the skull, and other injuries died while being removed to the Alice Home hospital in Lake Forest.

According to the story of Matt Mické, 1420 West Wisconsin avenue, Milwaukee, driver on the L. C. L. transportation company truck which crashed into the other machine, Nelson was driving on the wrong side of the road when the collision occurred. Mické is the only witness.
