A petition of necessity was received from the East Park district requesting the city to turn over certain property to the park district, including a seven-acre tract on Deerfield avenue and some property on St. Johns avenue opposite Beach street to be used for park purposes. The petition was filed and an ordinance will be presented later.

The telephone company was granted permit to install new conduits and a manhole in front of their building on St. Johns avenue.

Report of Justice of Peace John Conrad showed fines collected amounting to \$605. Report of Police Magistrate A. E. Smith showed fines totalling \$51 collected. The June report of the building inspector was presented. These reports were accepted and filed.

Bus Route: The committee appointed to investigate matter of North Shore bus line between Highland Park and Lake Zurich recommended that instead of following winding streets on east side route should cross to west side of railroads and then north to the Highwood station along Green Bay road. The report was referred to the corporation counsel.

The ordinance providing for improving of streets in Briergate Villas subdivision was passed. An ordinance also was adopted turning over the bathing beach to the park district, subject to acceptance of the Park board. Ordinances were passed, as previously mentioned, changing duties of corporation counsel and amending salary ordinance to conform with appointment of that official and the elimination of the office of city attorney. The bond of the new fireman, William Isom, was approved.

Electrical Commission: Mayor Lewis appointed and the council confirmed an electrical commission composed of S. D. Morris, chairman, Ed Hoskin, W. H. Thomas, Robert Greenslade, William Vetter. The duties of the commission are to arrange tentative rules and ordinance to control electrical installation in this city under the provisions of the new law passed by the legislature at the last session and which went into effect July 1, 1927. The city clerk was authorized to
