PROGRAM NEXT WEEK AT RAVINIA PARK

"LOHENGRIN" IS FEATURE

To Be Presented Thursday Night, July 28; Entire Week Replete With Operatic Treats of First Order

Another language will be heard at Ravinia during the week beginning Sunday, July 24th, with the presentation on Thursday night of Richard Wagner's great music drama, "Lohengrin." This German work has in seasons past been an outstanding favorite with all Ravinia patrons, and the fact that Mr. Eckstein has Elisabeth Rethberg and Edward Johnson available for its two leading roles gives assurance it will receive the same masterful presentation which has distinguished it in the past. Desire DeFrere will sing the role of Telramund for the first time on any stage.

The coming week is replete in operatic treats of the first order. In addition to "Lohengrin" one finds among the presentations which are to be given for the first time this season that merry old comic grand opera, "The Barber of Seville" and Halévy's intriguing work, "Ja Juive."

Tina Paggi will appear as Rosina. Mario Chamlee is to sing the part of Almadiva, and Mario Basiola will have the title role. Leon Rothier is cast as Don Basilio, and Vittorio Trevisan will have the part of Doctor Bartolo.

There is no work in the repertoire which is more replete in sheer melody or more amusing in action than in this Rossini opera. The role of Rosina gives promise of being especially grateful for Miss Paggi, for it offers the opportunity for a scintillating coloratura display. Mr. Chamlee long ago proved himself an admirable exponent of the lyric tenor part in this opera, and as Almadiva he will utilize the beauty of his tone quality to full effect. Mario Basiola, who is not only a splendid singer, but likewise an unusually good actor, finds himself completely at home as the mischievous busy-body Figaro, who is the barber of the title. PIONEER RESIDENT PASSES INTO REST

JAMES SHEAHAN IS DEAD

Death Early Tuesday Follows Surgical Operation Last Friday; Funeral Held This Morning

James E. Sheahan, pioneer resident of Highland Park, died about 1:45 o'clock Tuesday morning at the Highland Park hospital, following an operation for appendicitis performed Friday. He was taken ill Thursday and following the emergency operation he seemed improving, but complications occurred and he began to grow worse on Monday.

Mr. Sheahan was born on the old Sheehan farm west of town August 13, 1874, and lived always in this vicinity and at the location where his home on Sunset road now stands. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Sheahan, early settlers in this part of Lake county, and the family for three-quarters of a century have been well known in this region.

Surviving Relatives

On May 6, 1901, Mr. Sheahan married Miss Theresa Garrity, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Garrity, also pioneer residents north of Highland Park. Mr. Sheahan is living, and there are five children—James, John, Allan, Howard and Miss Theresa Sheahan, all residents of Highland Park.

Other near relatives living are two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. William Dooley, Mrs. Harry Mills, Charles and Frank Sheahan, all of whom reside in this city. Two brothers are dead, Daniel Sheahan, and John Sheahan, the latter for many years an efficient and popular member of the Highland Park police force.

James Sheahan was a member of the Church of the Immaculate Conception here and also of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. He was engaged for many years in farming his property west of town, but retired from active work several years ago. At one time he was commissioner of highways in Deerfield township and performed the duties of that office in a most satisfactory and praiseworthy manner.

Had Many Friends

No resident of Highland Park had more friends than James Sheahan, and by all he was held in highest regard because of his many estimable qualities. There is widespread sorrow in the community at his death, and the family have the deep sympathy of all in their bereavement.

The funeral service was held at 9 o'clock this morning at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, and burial was in St. Mary's cemetery, at Lake Forest.

FRED K. MAECHTLE IS DEAD; FUNERAL FRIDAY

Passes Away Tuesday Afternoon Following Long Illness; Burial at Milwaukee

Fred K. Maechtle, well known resident here for more than twenty years, died at 4:40 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, July 19, at his home, 635 Glenview avenue, following a long and painful illness.

He was born July 1, 1878, in Milwaukee, and was married there June 11, 1906, to Alice Braatz Kurtz, who survives. They came to Highland Park the same year and have lived here ever since. Near relatives left to mourn his loss, besides his widow, are a daughter, Janet; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Will Grasse of Charleston, W. Va.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Maechtle, and a sister, Mrs. E. B. (Olivia) Armentrout, all living at 314 North Green Bay road.

The funeral will be held Friday morning from the family residence, 635 Glenview avenue, and burial will be in the Valhalla cemetery, at Milwaukee.

Mr. Maechtle had been for several years employed in various responsible capacities by the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee railroad, and previously worked for some time for Fritz Bahr. He had many friends in this community who learn of his death with deep regret, and the relatives have the sympathy of all at this time.

Council Asks State To Aid Improvement Of N. Sheridan Road

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening a resolution was adopted requesting the State Department of Highways to grant the city aid in the improvement on Route 42, Sheridan road, from Central avenue to the north limits of the city.

It was pointed out in the resolution that the city has made two efforts for the purpose of caring for traffic needs on this piece of highway, and inasmuch as 90 per cent of the traffic on it is through traffic, etc., the city feels justified in making the request in question.

The committee appointed to investigate and report on Central avenue and Sheridan road submitted a report which was referred to the city clerk with instructions to arrange a meeting between the committee and the council.

The committee appointed to investigate on the advisability of a city manager submitted a report and action was deferred until a meeting of the committee and the council can be arranged for further discussion of the matter.

An ordinance was passed granting permit to the East Park district to occupy and use a portion of block 28, known as the Highland Park bathing beach, for park, playground and bathing beach purposes, and to maintain and equip the same.

An ordinance to amend the ordinance fixing salaries of city officers and certain employees was ordered filed. The bond of Bowen E. Schumacher as corporation counsel was approved, with Edwin L. Gilroy and Catherine H. Gilroy as sureties.

An ordinance permitting the East Park district to occupy and use Memorial Park (Hazel park) for a memorial park and to maintain and equip the same was ordered filed for inspection.

The city clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for a motor grader for the street department, the bids to be received at 5 p. m. Monday, Aug. 8, 1927.

The ordinance making appropriations for the fiscal year was ordered placed on file for inspection for one week.

Mayor Lewis appointed Mrs. Antoinette Huhnke, the present incumbent, as visiting nurse, and the appointment was approved by the council.
