NASH CAR PRODUCTION LARGEST IN HISTORY

Several Plants Turning Out Automobiles at Rate of About 800 Daily

Production at the Nash plants in Kenosha, Racine and Milwaukee of 700 to 800 cars a day is greater than at any time in the history of the company. This announcement made today by officials of the Nash Motors company is coupled with the further statement that in spite of the record production orders from dealers for the new models, announced three weeks ago, are in excess of the combined capacity of the three Nash plants and the orders therefore are being filled in rotation as they are received. The situation bears out the statement made by C. W. Nash to the board of directors in which he pointed out that the last six months period would be "extremely active."

HIGHWOOD CHILD DIES OF DIPHTHERIA, REPORT

June Frances Rettig, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Rettig, 220 North avenue, Highwood, died Monday morning, July 18, after a short illness of diphtheria. The funeral was held Monday afternoon and burial was in the Lake Forest cemetery. The little girl was aged eight years and twenty days.

Several cases of diphtheria have been reported in Highwood in the last few months, and two or three deaths have resulted during that time, believed to be from this cause. As a result the health authorities are endeavoring to locate the source of the contagion and to trace its history in as far as possible. Precautions are being taken to prevent further spread of the disease.
