CENSORSHIP PREVENTS QUESTIONABLE MOVIES

Several Pictures Barred and Is Generally Satisfactory

"A Night of Love," "The Show," "The Brute," "On Ze Boulevard," "Snowbound" and "Secret Studio," were rejected by the local board of censorship as unfit for presentation in Highland Park.

It is not presumable that any theater between Lake Forest and Chicago will run any of these pictures if they are actuated by a consideration of the wishes of patrons who desire to see the screen rid of tawdry or unnecessary material.

The present censor does not bare ruling on only the risque or unsavory product but also rules on what might be "silly," "without entertainment value," "preaching prejudice" or "offensive to intelligence."

The local theaters are pleased with the judgment exercised so far by the censor although some of these pictures possess great box office values. The only fear expressed is that many may go to see these pictures elsewhere, where a disregard for censorship principles may exist.

Pictures rejected in Highland Park suffer the same fate in Evanston. While Wilmette has no local censorship, the management of the theater there exercises excellent judgment and refuses to play pictures disapproved of by nearby neighbors.

LAST OF PATRIOTIC SONG WRITTEN IN BOAT

Spoilage Greater In Summer and Great Economy Possible By Prevention

The last lines of "The Star Spangled Banner" were written in a row boat by Francis Scott Key and were not penned in the hold of a prison ship, as the old school-books taught.

Legendary history was that Key was a prisoner of war while watching the British bombardment of Baltimore and Fort M'Henry during the war of 1812. The correct story has been brought to light by the Woman's Home Companion, which shows that Key was permitted to go to the British flagship under a truce signal to obtain the release of a friend who had been taken prisoner, and arrived just as the enemy was ready to open fire.

The young poet developed his verses during the anxiety of the night, but it was while returning to shore in a small boat the following morning that he wrote exultantly: "Tis the Star Spangled Banner, Oh! long may it wave o'er the land of the free and the home of the brave."

MINE SAFETY WORK PRAISED BY HOOVER

RECENT CONTEST SUCCESS

Many Mines and Quarries in U. S. Participated and Result, He Believes, Will Be Notable

Herbert Hoover states that the results of the National Safety competition in the mines and quarries of the United States may lead the world in country "afford the best hope that the mine safety as it is already leading in mineral production." More than 250 mines and quarries participated in 1926 in the nation-wide industrial safety contest, held annually under the auspices of the Bureau of Mines, Department of Commerce, and the winners are being presented with the bronze trophy "Sentinels of Safety," awarded by the Explosives Engineer magazine.

Special Mention

In announcing the notable accomplishments in the production of large mineral tonnages with no loss of time occasioned by accidents as revealed by the detailed statistical reports furnished the bureau by competing companies, special mention is given to a zinc and lead mine in Kansas operated 300 days and worked 206,489 man-hours without an accident involving loss of an employee's time. A Missouri zinc mine, and 14 large quarries located in West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Indiana, Ohio, Kansas, California, Virginia, and Michigan, also operated through the year with no loss of time due to personal injuries. The competition required the preparation of accident statistic reports on a uniform, detailed basis which allows a more exhaustive study of the causes of accidents than has heretofore been possible. An encouraging feature of the competition was a substantial reduction in

the accident rates of the winning companies, which amounted to 37 per cent in severity and 44 per cent in frequency as compared with the previous years' contests.

Five Groups The different industries participating in the competition were divided into five groups: anthracite mines, bituminous coal mines, metal mines, mines producing non-metallic minerals, and quarries or open pit mines. A replica of the trophy is awarded by the Bureau of Mines to the mining operation of each group sustaining the smallest loss of time from accidents in proportion of total time during the year. A feature of the competition is the awarding of a certificate of honor, signed by the directors of the Bureau of Mines, to every employee of each of the winning mines and quarries.
