

GLENCOE GOLF CLUB TO HAVE BUILDING

The new club house at the Glencoe Golf course, for which ground was formally broken during the invitation tournament last week, and on which operation will be begun in about a week, will be located to the south and west of the present club house. John A. Scribbins, of 455 Drexel avenue, is the architect.

The building is of early English design, with half timber and plaster work. It is one story in height, with the exception of the center portion. Here, on the second floor, will be the manager's room, committee rooms, etc.

The club will be constructed in three different sections. The first section will comprise the men's locker rooms, grill room, toilet and showers. There will be a large screened porch overlooking the golf course to the south and southwest.

WILLIAMS RECOVERS FROM SEVERE BURNS

J. H. Williams, assistant village manager of Glencoe and superintendent of the Glencoe Golf club, who was seriously burned in an explosion of naphtha, was able to attend the Glencoe club tournament last week though not to play. He came out for a little while about noon time and was very glad indeed to see him again.

It was the first time he had been permitted to leave the hospital since July 2 when he and Mrs. Williams were severely burned as the result of an explosion of naphtha in their home. Mrs. Williams will not be able to leave the hospital for a few weeks, but is slowly recovering. Mr. Williams says that despite the fact that both he and Mrs. Williams were severely burned about the face, physicians declare no permanent scars will remain.

WOMAN WHO SHOT HER DAUGHTERS MAY LIVE

Ruth Schoenberger, the Long Lake woman, who fired a bullet into her head on the night of July 2, after killing her youngest daughter and shooting her other daughter, will probably survive, Dr. Karl M. Beck, the attending physician said last week. At the outset, it was believed there was no chance to save the life of the woman. Last Wednesday she started to rally and for the first time hope was held out for her but on Friday she had a sinking spell and it was thought death was a matter of hours. She took a change for the better on Saturday and her physical condition has been improving steadily ever since.

MAN DIES IN FIRE IN WAUKEGAN BLOCK

Orlando Burris Falls to Death When Smoke Drives Him Out; Others Injured

Orlando Burris, 73, is dead of injuries received in a fire that attacked the Purdy apartment building, Waukegan, owned by Jacob Blumberg, shortly before 2:30 o'clock Saturday morning. Miss Hanora Brown, another occupant of the building, was removed to the Lake County General hospital in an ambulance, suffering from nervous shock, and more than thirty other tenants were driven into the street, many in their night clothes. Mrs. Ida Holzer received painful burns on her right hand and forearm when she returned to her apartment in search of her purse and other valuables.

Damage to the building and its contents, it is estimated, was between \$35,000 and \$40,000. The fire, starting in the basement, spread with such rapidity to the entire three floors of the building that occupants of the six apartments had difficulty in escaping with their lives. There was no time to save any of their personal belongings.

LIBERTYVILLE DAY IS GREAT SUCCESS

Big Crowd and Fine Celebration Last Thursday at That Town

In spite of the shower which fell in the morning and the threatening weather during the afternoon, the second annual Libertyville Day celebration which was held last Thursday was an unqualified success from the time the parade started to the hour when the last reveler left the grounds at the close of the evening festivities. The crowd, which was estimated at upwards of five thousand people, found plenty to amuse and entertain them in the large and varied program provided by the management and which started as soon as the parade reached the fair grounds.

The parade, which was more than a half mile in length starting at the high school and passing through the business section on Milwaukee avenue. The band from Fort Sheridan headed the procession and was followed by a succession of floats entered by local institutions and industries.

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ANTIOCH BARBER SHOP CLEANED BY THIEVES

Thieves broke into the barber shop owned by Herman Radke, Antioch, some time between midnight and early Thursday morning, gaining entrance through a rear window and looting the shop of 15 razors, two

motor clippers, six boxes of cigars, two slot machines and \$5 in cash.

The robbery was reported to the village marshal at Antioch who notified Sheriff Doolittle. An investigation is being made. No fingerprints were found, according to the sheriff's report.

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
