## GREATER DEERFIELD DAY PLANS PROGRESS

TO BE HELD AUG. 26 - 27

\$6000 in Prizes to Be Given Away; To Erect New Dance Platform in Jewett Park

At a meeting of the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce last Friday evening, the reports of the various committees in charge of arrangements for Greater Deerfield Celebration on August 26 and 27 were made showing much progress in all departments for the annual affair. Each committee was put to work and they will report at the next meeting of the association on August 6th.

It was decided at this meeting to divide the proceeds in the following manner: Fifty percent will go to Greater Deerfield plans; twenty-five percent to education, this amount being divided, ten percent to go to the Deerfield school, ten percent to the Wilmot school, and five percent to the library; twenty-five percent is to be put into a sinking fund.

There are about \$6,000 worth of prizes to be given away at this big event among which is a \$2100 Chrysler, a \$1000 Orthophonic Victrola and radio combined, and nine other major prizes.

The usual concessions, refreshments, games and dancing will be held. A new dance platform is to be erected in Jewett Park and it is planned to leave this platform standing for the use of the band, in order that benefit dances may be given for the band.

It is planned to put up arch lights through the business district on Waukegan avenue and Deerfield road, to be left up until Christmas time.

Everyone should make an effort to attend this affair as it will be one of the biggest in the history of Deerfield.

## START SUIT AGAINST BRACHER'S BONDSMEN

Outside the pale of the grand jury investigations the problem confronting the county in the defaultation of Treasurer Roy Bracher are rapidly growing to a head with the promise of a new treasurer to take his chair.

State's Attorney Smith's contemplated step of suing the Bracher and Pearsall bondsmen came to full reality last week when he took action in the circuit court by filing praecipes in three separate suits. Each case demanded \$110,000.

Possibly but one of the three lists of bondsmen will be liable for the \$100,000 claimed by the county and possibly all. The consensus of opinion is that the last set of bondsmen are liable for all.

Col. Smith filed three separate suits as a matter to "smoke the bondsmen out" and establish at law just who is liable. If the shortage has not been covered by then he will be in a position to go in and ask judgment against these men.

## TWO SHOOTING AT OFFICERS, BELIEF

Removal of a .38 calibre lead bullet from the ankle of Stanley Thompson, 50, Antioch constable, last week at the Victory Memorial hospital, Waukegan, revealed the fact that he had been the target for two automatics rather than just the one in the hands of Ralph Barnett, Chicago gunman, who he shot dead in a duel at Channel Lake several weeks ago.

Sheriff Doolittle, at his preliminary examination, found that one of the pellets fired at Thompson had been a .45 calibre steel nosed bullet. This he picked out of a board and gave to Thompson as a memento of the fight.

Who handled the other gun will remain a mystery, the sheriff feels certain.

If Thompson had not run out of cartridges he would have claimed more than Barnett as a victim, the sheriff contends. Thompson had been wounded by the first flash of firing and was on the ground with a bullet in each ankle when he drew his weapon and blew six straight shots into Barnett's heart.
