

TRAINING CAMP AT FORT OPENS TODAY

EXPECT OVER 1,800 MEN

Largest Group Assigned to This Camp Since World War; Many Attractions; Visitors Are Invited

The largest group to be assigned to Fort Sheridan since the days of the World War will arrive here Thursday and Friday of this week, when 1,800 boys and young men from Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan, arrive to start their 30 day training in the Citizens Military Training camp, commonly known as the "Citizenship School of the Army."

These young men will spend one month living in tents on the bluffs of Lake Michigan, under the supervision of officers of the regular army and a selected group from the Officers Reserve Corps.

Morning Duties

Their mornings will be devoted to instruction in military drill, firing on the target range, and lectures on citizenship and American history. The afternoon hours will be spent in athletics. Playing fields have been laid off and coaches will be provided for football, baseball, soccer, volleyball, and basketball. There will also be instructors in fencing, boxing, wrestling, swimming, tennis and track and field events.

A schedule of games and competitions has been drawn up calling for games between companies and states in each of the events. Medals and prizes will be awarded members of all championship teams and to the winners in the individual events.

Visitors Welcomed

Many visitors are expected at Fort Sheridan during the C. M. T. camp and elaborate plans are being made for their entertainment. Each Saturday morning there will be a parade and review of the men of the C. M. T. C. and during the week there will be athletic games and demonstrations of troops in action by details from the regular army organizations of the post.

August 19 has been designated as "Visitors Day," when it is expected that many hundreds of parents and relatives of the boys of the C. M. T. C. will be present. A special program for the day is being prepared by Lieut. Col. M. M. Keck, post executive officer.
